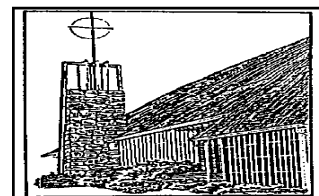

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARY ROBINSON-MOHR

Happy end of summer! I hope you have all been able to enjoy the beautiful sunny days we have had recently.

A seminary professor writes about the following question posed to him by a student.

“How do you get to Chartres Cathedral from Paris?” the student asked.

“Well, you simply head south,” I replied. “It’s well marked all the way. Just head due south, as I recall.”

“How do you get from Jesus to the Chartres Cathedral?” he persisted. “How do you get from a guy who didn’t write a book, never formed an organization, never built a building, to something that huge, glorious, and grand?”

It is an interesting question. I’m not sure it has one pat answer, either. In so many words, it is a question that I have pondered several different times over the last few months.

It is a question that was a sub-theme for our travels in Turkey and Greece last May. We wandered through ruins that had once been part of cities where early Christianity had met some “growth points.” Ancient churches reflected a growing sense of awe and grandeur as Christianity became more and more established, especially Holy Sophia in Istanbul. But these ruins also told tales of struggle, even persecution and repression of Christianity. One of the sites we visited in Turkey was Iznik, the location of ancient Nicaea. The First Ecumenical Council met here, and we walked through the ruins of the old church that had hosted the Seventh Ecumenical Council. These councils helped a new and growing faith shape its belief and identity. The most famous result of the First council is the Nicene Creed, which announces to a wondering world the unique nature of Jesus Christ. Yet a generation after that First council, the Church continued to debate the conclusions of that council. Doesn’t that sound like Presbyterians wrestling through a General Assembly, revisiting decisions again and again?

I thought of these things as I sat through the General Assem-

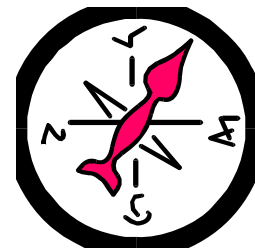

bly meeting last June in Richmond, Virginia. As I watched our Church slowly yet deliberately consider the work of Jesus Christ through Presbyterianism, I wondered, "What would Jesus do if he sat here next to me as a commissioner? Perhaps he who, to our knowledge, never wrote anything would get lost in the stacks of reports and recommendations!"

Yet I also recalled how it was that deliberative and reflective process that is credited by some scholars with being the reason that Christianity outlasted the popular mystery religions of the early centuries. Antonia Tripolitis writes of Mithraism: "Mithraism's remarkable ability to adapt to any environment in which it found itself, in the long run, proved to be damaging.... This caused it to lose its strength, definiteness, and cohesion. Finally, Mithraism did not have an established clerical hierarchy or a professional clergy, nor a developed organizational structure.... There is no evidence of a central organization or an established set of common rules, important factors in the survival of Judaism and Christianity even as minorities in a hostile environment."

The Church of Jesus Christ sometimes offends, sometimes comforts, sometimes hosts disagreements, sometimes hosts reconciliations. It is not always an easy place to be. It certainly does not sit still, and it does not let the status quo or popularity contests guide its purpose. It does not become solely the meetings, the institution, or the church buildings that it includes. It follows the way of Jesus Christ, by the work of the Holy Spirit. May we faithfully follow, so that future generations will also have the gift of the Church available to them.

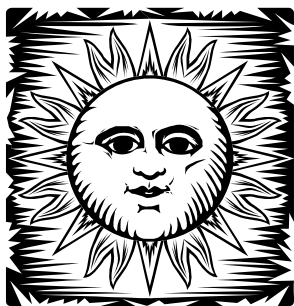

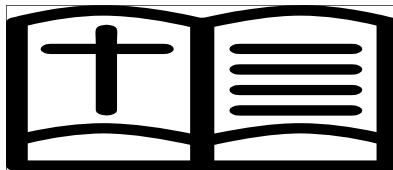

A NEW LOOK AT MARK'S GOSPEL

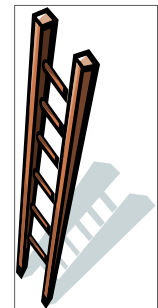
