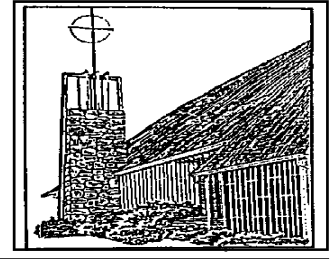

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARY ROBINSON-MOHR

For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead.
– James 2:26

Have you noticed that October is a month with many themes? Many institutions use October as a time to educate persons about or promote their causes. October is “Domestic Violence Awareness Month,” for one. Many schools and universities hold homecoming celebrations during October, too.

October holds many themes for Presbyterian churches, and for our congregation in particular. The first Sunday in October is World Communion Sunday, a time when we remember that we are not just an isolated and local community club. A big part of our identity states loudly and clearly that we are part of a worldwide movement, a belief beyond our horizons, and that is Christianity. We will express our unity in Christ with other Christians across the unseen but very real boundaries of nation, race, and culture as we gather around Christ’s Table.

In the spirit of World Communion, the Presbyterian Church, USA affirms its commitment to Peacemaking as “The Believer’s Calling.” The Peacemaking Offering will be dedicated during our World Communion worship service. This expands the theme of our worldwide unity to also reflect upon our calling as Christians to bear the reconciliation of God to the broken world around us on personal as well as community levels.

The Shower of Stoles display will enhance our worship space throughout our season of worldwide commitment and peacemaking on two Sundays, October 2 and 9. It will give us the opportunity to prayerfully and worshipfully consider an issue that has attracted many debates, prayer, and thought in our denomination, namely, how much or how little persons of different sexual orientations should participate in the work and witness of the Church. The display will conclude with a guest preacher on October 9, Michael Adee of More Light Presbyterians.

The 2005 season of Stewardship Commitment begins on Sunday, October 16, and continues through October 30. You will be invited in several ways to consider how the responsible and faithful caretaking of all of your resources enhances and

further the ministry to which Christ calls us, individually and corporately. Moments for Mission will appear in worship throughout the month, calling us to celebrate what we have done together in faithful ministry.

The last Sunday of October is Reformation Sunday. Amid the affirmations of our Reformed Tradition, I offer to you words from our Confession of 1967 that seem to encompass all of the “many themes of October”:

To be reconciled to God is to be sent into the world as God’s reconciling community. This community, the church universal, is entrusted with God’s message of reconciliation and shares God’s labor of healing the enmities which separate people from God and from each other. Christ has called the church to this mission and given it the gift of the Holy Spirit. The church maintains continuity with the apostles and with Israel by faithful obedience to his call. (Book of Confessions, 9.31)

May October be a time for our congregation to grow in its works of faith, and in its ministries and commitment to be God’s reconciling community in the world!

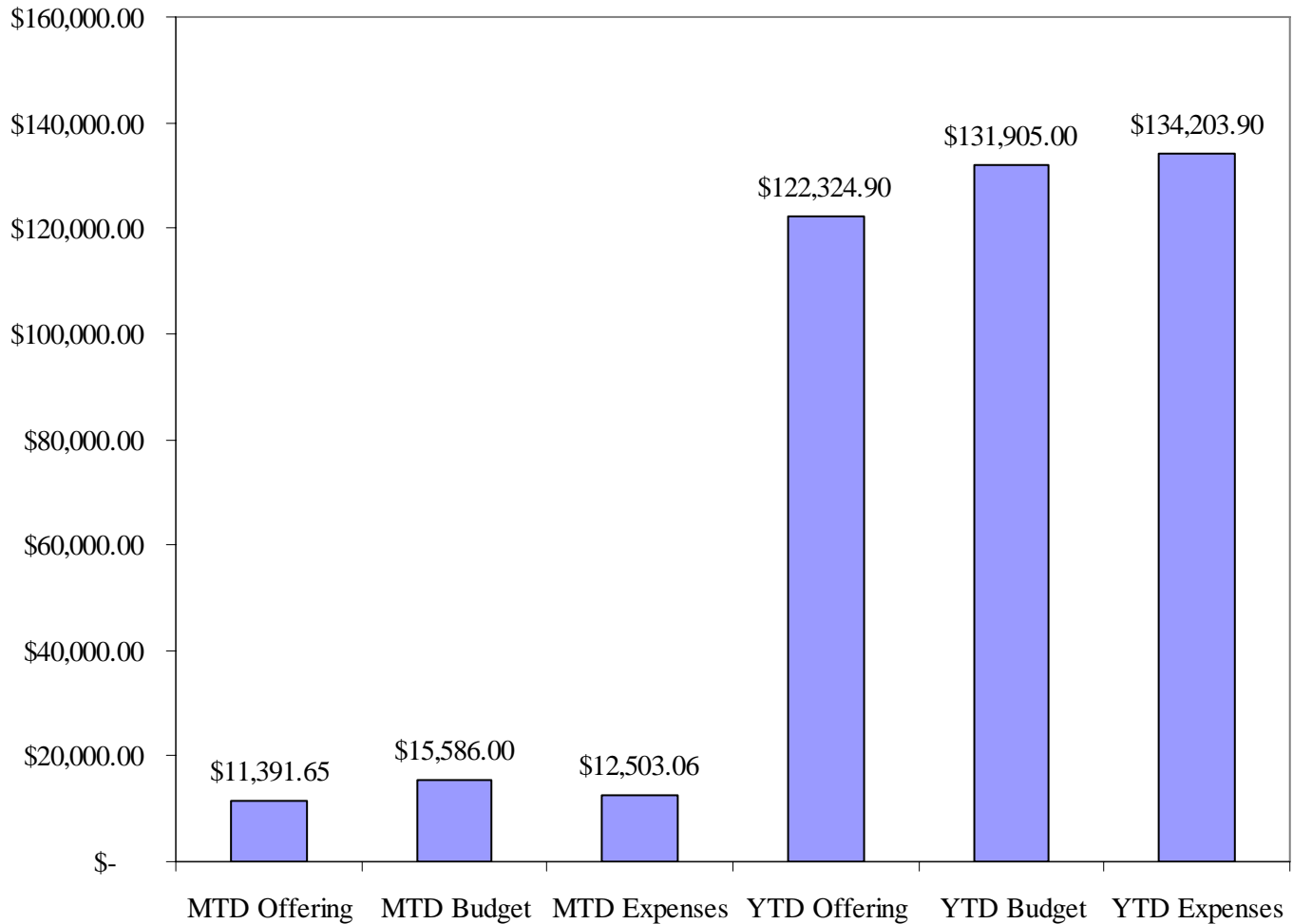

WELCOME MICHAEL ADEE!

We have an opportunity to hold a season of reflection around our Peacemaking Offering, to consider who God invites to the Table of Jesus Christ. To that end, the Membership Committee is sponsoring a second showing of the Shower of Stoles on World Communion and Peacemaking Sunday, October 2, and on Sunday, October 9. We are delighted that the display of the Shower of Stoles will conclude with a special guest preacher, Michael Adee. Below is some information about Michael, so that you may become acquainted with this gifted Presbyterian.

Michael has been working in the LGBT community and the HIV-AIDS Community since 1988. A human rights/gay activist and an educator, Michael works for the full inclusion of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender persons in society and in faith communities. He earned his Ph.D. in Rhetoric and Communication from Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge.

Having served as a college professor in Louisiana, Kentucky and Ohio, he has also been a hospital and hospice chaplain, bereavement counselor, campus minister, diversity consultant, tennis coach and a teacher/relief worker in Zimbabwe, Africa. Michael served on the founding Board of Directors of Friends For Life, the Baton Rouge AIDS Task Force and as their first volunteer communications director. He served as a buddy and volunteer trainer for AVOC, AIDS Volunteers of Cincinnati and as the Executive Director of Stonewall Cincinnati, and program developer for Cincinnati PFLAG..

Michael is the former Executive Director of The Experience, a national LGBT educational/wellness organization, in Santa Fe, New Mexico. He has served on the Board of Directors of The Coalition for Equality in New Mexico and for the Santa Fe Human Rights Alliance. He is a member of Santa Fe PFLAG and the first openly gay elder, First Presbyterian Church, Santa Fe. He began his work as the National Field Organizer for More Light Presbyterians in 1999.

In addition to his community leadership and service, he has received numerous awards and recognitions. These include: Outstanding Young Men of America; Outstanding Instructor and Who's Who Among Colleges and Universities at Louisiana State University; the Norse Leadership Society Award for Teacher of the Year, Northern Kentucky University; the National Community Service Award, Vitas Hospice, for his work as a hospice chaplain and bereavement counselor.

A noted speaker and teacher, Michael has spoken at hundreds of national, regional and local conferences and meetings, on college campuses and in communities of faith across the country. He weaves insight, compassion and humor into his presentations.

Over time, he has held memberships in and participated in the Wilderness Society, the Sierra Club, the National Organization for Women, ACLU, Amnesty International, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the Human Rights Campaign, the Southern Poverty Law Center, Habitat for Humanity, and the United States Tennis Association.

In addition to being an activist and an educator, as an out gay athlete he has competed in tennis in the last three Gay Games, most recently in Sydney, Australia where he was a quarter-finalist. Michael believes in a world where every person is valued, every person has enough and where all persons have full, equal, human and civil rights.

SHOWER OF STOLES

The Shower of Stoles is here! The Shower of Stoles is a collection of hundreds of liturgical stoles from gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender persons from twenty-three denominations in five countries. Each stole contains the story of a GLBT person who is active in the life and leadership of their faith community in some way: minister, elder, deacon, teacher, missionary, musician, administrator or active layperson. October 2 and 9, stoles will be displayed in the church. *Organized by the Membership committee.*

Eagle Wings: Enriching Congregations

Eagle Wings disAbility Ministries responds to the unmet relational and spiritual needs of adults with disabilities and their families. There are more than 111,000 people with disabilities who live in the North Puget Sound area. Hendrik “Henk” Wapstra founded Eagle Wings in September 2000 to provide churches of North Puget Sound Presbytery a partnership with the disabled adults in the community. Eagle Wings educates, equips and trains church volunteers to meet the relational needs of adults within that church’s area.

Kinder Holdaway, associate director of Eagle Wings disAbility Ministries, said, “At my first Christmas celebration in 2004, I discovered the gift in listening to adults who cannot verbalize their own words. Unmotivated by personal greed, selfish ambition, or even what God has to offer them, they wholly offered themselves without restraint.

“This has forever changed my personal relationship with God into a more honest, true relationship,” Holdaway said. “It gave me an understanding that we all have disabilities of one sort or another. It’s just that we try to hide ours on the inside, and theirs are out in the open for all to see. It made me ask: ‘Why aren’t all these adults in church? Are they being welcomed? Would I want to worship with them? Would I consider them as God’s gift to me and the Church?’”

Eagle Wings offers churches an opportunity to experience people with disabilities as contributors to the health and welfare of congregations. Persons with disabilities can be our teachers for, even as many of them are dependent on others and God, so are we dependent on God and His grace. And, even as God loves them with their physical and developmental imperfections, so does God love us with our often invisible imperfections.

Eagle Wings believes that because disabled individuals have suffered so much, it can offer us deeper insight into the suffering of Jesus and what he endured on our behalf.

NORTH PUGET SOUND PRESBYTERY RESPONDS TO SURVIVORS OF HURRICANE KATRINA

A. What can you do now?

1. PRAY.
2. Thanks to Wayne Kaste and Tony Cook for driving our Shelter Health Kits and Hope in a Box Kits to San Antonio. (If you are watching the news about Hurricane Rita, you know these kits will be needed immediately.) North Puget Sound Presbytery collected about 3200 Shelter Health Kits and 45 Hope in a Box Kits. Wayne and Tony left Wednesday, September 21 at 8:30 a.m., and planned to pick up about 1000 more kits collected by Olympia Presbytery that same morning. Thanks be to God!
3. Ask your church to consider sponsoring a family in San Antonio. Mission Presbytery will soon identify twelve families that would benefit with the help of the local Housing Authority. Such a commitment from a congregation would be to support a family (to the degree the congregation can support them) until the family is self-supporting. This could include sending needed kitchen utensils, linens, Christmas baskets, money for clothes, furniture, etc. Gail Neal is in San Antonio now and will get more information about this emerging program for us.
4. Send money to help Mission Presbytery buy bedding for evacuees still being sheltered. The address for Mission Presbytery is 7201 Broadway #303, San Antonio, Texas, 78209; phone number 210-826-3296.
5. Register your desire to help in a variety of ways with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. Their website (pcusa.org/pda) has on-line forms that will register you in a skill bank for possible work teams, or register you to open your home or church building to persons needing shelter. You can also register to sponsor a family or give a money donation.
6. Consider joining a work team. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance has a new toll-free number for volunteers: 866-732-6121. Also, watch for opportunities to join with other Presbyterians from North Puget Sound. It is our desire to organize teams to travel at a later date.

B. Updates from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

1. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) has been in contact with the Synod of the Sun related to Hurricane Katrina and will continue to work with the synod and affected presbyteries to determine an appropriate response to Hurricane Rita. Based on the extent of damage and geographic area of impact, PDA's response to Hurricane Rita may be included as part of the current appeal for Hurricane Katrina. More information will be known after the hurricane has made landfall. Presbyterians across the nation have generously responded to Hurricane Katrina. Thousands of individuals have offered their time, talents and treasures to help the disaster survivors. Presbyterian congregations are participating in the feeding, housing, and caring for many of the displaced families. PDA funds are being used to support relief efforts in Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and a growing number of states where Katrina evacuees are being relocated. Funds have also been provided to Church World Service as they consider how to incorporate the international refugee resettlement model for providing assistance to Katrina's displaced. Please continue to regularly check the PDA website (www.pcusa.org/pda) for updates on the situation.
2. A new need has been identified. PDA dedicated the first 'volunteer village' in Gautier, MS and is working on the second one in D'Iberville, MS. Eventually, we hope to have up to fifteen sites and need individuals to help manage these sites. We are looking for retired individuals, preferably retired military, who can plan, organize, command and evaluate the activities of the site and the 150 volunteers who will be working out of the site. Selected individuals will be living in the volunteer village (tents) and will need to know how to adjust to changing situations.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Session met for a special meeting on September 11, 2005. Matt Hargleroad, Wayne Terry, and Emily Thornton were welcomed into membership. This was followed by the regular meeting. Janet Oakley, Bev Stewart and Laura Crandall were appointed to serve as Commissioners at Presbytery in Anacortes on September 17, 2005.

The fall and winter calendar was reviewed and approved as follows.

Session reviewed the congregation's consideration of the e-mail by-laws amendment that was tabled. Carla Shafer and Rook Van Halm were commissioned to rewrite the motion taking into consideration the questions that were raised, and present the revision at the meeting of the congregation on the 25th when it will "come off the table."

Carol Ayers letter of resignation was accepted.

The finances were reviewed and funds disbursements were assigned to appropriate accounts. Committee chairs were requested to submit 2006 budget requests prior to October 9th.

Bill Read reported for the Deacons and commended their work.

Committee reports were received. Congregational Life was thanked for the wonderful Discipleship Event. The College Study group starts Oct. 22, 2005. Volunteers will be needed to provide a light lunch for them. The Advent Festival will be November 27, 2005.

The Parade of Stoles will be here for a week beginning October 11. Michael Adey will be speaking. Pictures will be taken for the pictorial directory October 5-8, 2005.

Mission and Social Action advised that the Crop Walk is organized and the water is ready, the Shelter Health kits for Hurricane Katrina are being collected, and the Rev. Abu Akel will be here between November 14 and 17. Their recommendations for mission giving of \$4100 for this quarter were considered. It was decided to delay payments several weeks due to low revenue.

It was agreed to raise the organist annual salary to \$6,023 which is \$1,688 higher than last year, as we are not competitive with the current market.

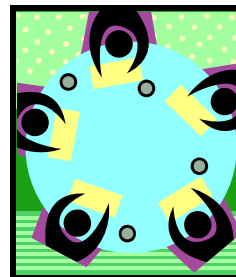
