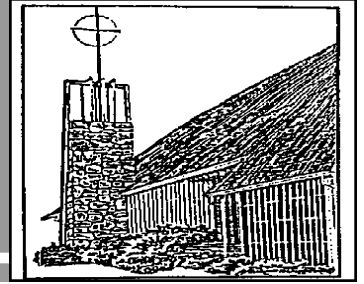

The journey through Lent is about to end. The Christian community called Saint James Presbyterian Church has spent this season in prayer, devotion, study, worship, and presence. Through our devotional booklet, rich with insights from so many, we have had times to grow in faith and prayer individually, yet together. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION THROUGHOUT THE EASTER SEASON

Easter, 2007

Dear Families,

AFTER THE FORTY DAYS OF LENT, WE COME TO THE GLORIOUS CELEBRATION OF EASTER. WHITE AND GOLD, SYMBOLS OF VICTORY AND CELEBRATION, ARE THE COLORS OF EASTER AND THE ENTIRE SEASON WHICH ENDS ON PENTECOST SUNDAY. WHY NOT CARRY THE JOY OF EASTER THROUGHOUT THE WHOLE SEASON IN YOUR FAMILY?

HERE ARE SOME THINGS YOU CAN DO:

Several times during the Easter season, get up before the sunrise. Watch the sun rise together. Plan a special breakfast, or go to a favorite restaurant.

Make Easter baskets and surprise people with them throughout this season. Instead of sweets or eggs, plant flowers in them.

Recall baptism stories about family members and remember the early Christians who were baptized at dawn on Easter morning.

Bake Easter bread from scratch or use frozen dough. Add candied fruit or nuts. Look in cookbooks for ethnic breads to celebrate Easter.

Select something you did during Lent to continue doing during the Season of Easter.

Parents, grandparents and friends of younger children will find a helpful article in the Horizon Room, "Why Did Jesus Die?" It's important to remember that children and adults ask many of the same questions about the death of Christ. Christian writer and educator, Delia Halverson, gives ideas "to munch on" with respect to differing approaches to theology.

TREASURER'S REPORT SALLY ALBERS

The Per Capita assessment for 2007 is \$48.07 per active member. St. James paid \$11,681 in January to the North Puget Sound Presbytery, which passes along a major share to the headquarters of the Presbyterian Church (USA). In our pledge drive for 2007 about half of the membership pledged to pay per capita in addition to their regular pledge for local church operations. About 54% of those pledges have already been received, a total of \$3,120.45.

I would like to encourage all members to make a per capita contribution, in appreciation for the many services the PC(USA) provides. In this way our regular contributions can stretch to cover more local needs. Give joyously, knowing that it is for the benefit of God's work in this world.

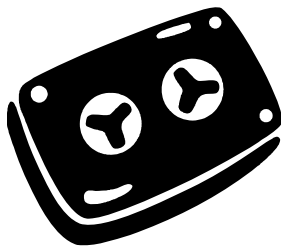


SUNDAY MORNING PARKING

Our morning worship service is audio-taped each Sunday. If you know of anyone who would like a copy of any recent service, please check the church one out in library.



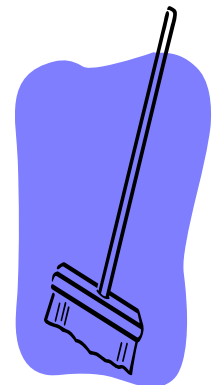

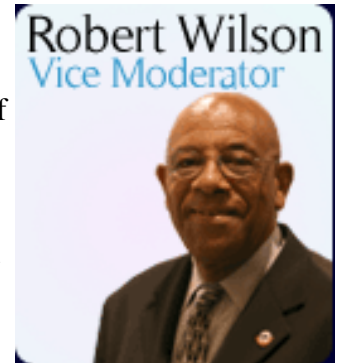

"ECO PALMS" FOR PALM SUNDAY

Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem, accented by the jubilant waving of palm branches, is re-enacted each Palm Sunday in Presbyterian and other Christian congregations worldwide as Holy Week observances begin. Unfortunately for the communities where these palms are harvested, palm fronds do not always represent the same jubilation they do for us. This year the PC(USA) is teaming up with Lutheran World Relief, Catholic Relief Services and the University of Minnesota to offer congregations the option of purchasing responsibly harvested eco-palm branches for Palm Sunday. The palms come from communities in Mexico and Guatemala where workers are paid fairly and engage in sustainable harvesting in order to protect the local ecosystem.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS ~ MARCH 11, 2007

CARLA SHAFER, CLERK

The meeting opened with prayer before dinner with the Session and guests interested in becoming new members: Craig Keyes, Julie Keyes, Elizabeth Snyder, Kevin Terpstra, Cheryl Terpstra, Nicole Lang, and Rich Stipe. After dinner and conversation all were accepted into membership by confession of faith and Cheryl Terpstra was received by letter of transfer from Hope in Christ, Bellingham, WA. Randy Bowers, Membership Chair, introduced new member sponsors: Randy for Cheryl, Jenny Sue for Nicole and Kevin, Erin for her parents, Jack Drury for Elizabeth, and Rook Van Halm for Rich.

Session will meet on April 15, May 20 and June 24, 2007 at the regular time of 7 PM. Nancy Pace will chair and Carla Shafer will serve on the Nominating committee. Deacon, Teresa Bowers reported that the Parish brunch was attended by about 70 people and that it was very successful. Sally Albers, Treasurer, reported that we paid the per capita in January, the check cleared in February, the gas bill was very high and the stock market fell, but we have sufficient revenues. She noted that already in March we made up what we appeared to be short in February.

Jean Seater raised the concern of the Personnel committee that the staff hasn't had a cost of living increasing for three years. The committee feels that care of staff is our number one priority. Dale Monroe responded that the development of the budget is a collaborative effort. The committees will work together with Sally gathering data. We have an Organist's Contract with Kirsten Rutschman through August, 2007. Dale reported that the Trustees will review the proposed insurance for 2007 and 2008.

David Meyer reported that the Worship Committee is working on Holy Week activities. They are looking for Seder service table hosts. David advised that there will be a Healing Service 5/27/07. He thanked the Congregational life Committee for a great job providing food on Fat Tuesday.

Friendly Visitors are requesting a local Internet mailbox which we can do easily. Randy Bowers, who is volunteering with Tech support and Internet Website development explained that this would not present a security risk.

Jack Drury reported that the contract for the kindergarten and preschool will be signed with increases of \$ 35 plus \$13.50/month for 12 months yellow pages ad. Kitchen door closure replacement costs will be taken out of the Facilities Endowment Fund. The stairway skylight has been repaired. The ones in the sanctuary will need bids as they can be replaced. A Building and Grounds Operation and Maintenance manual is being written. The Church Clean-up day in March went very well. All the outside windows have been cleaned, thanks to Susannah and Randy.

Congregational life committee is looking for Seder dinner hosts and they need one more volunteer for Easter breakfast on April 8th.

Randy reported that the new e-mail addresses for the church have been set up. New pew pocket feedback cards have been placed for the membership committee to review and four new banners will be purchased.

John Dobbie reported that the Presbytery Mission and Social Action committee meeting where they expressed interest in developing a network.

.Presbytery elected Carla Shafer to serve on Presbytery Council for one year. STJ Presbytery Task Force members are Carla, Randy, David and Susan Burkland. They will need congregation-wide help for the May 16th Presbytery Meeting to be held here. The Growth Plan Task Force nominating committee, chaired by Dale, will meet to recommend members to the Session in April. Congregational Life has agreed to include a young married couple's group under their outreach. Teresa and Randy Bowers, Matt Hargleroad and David Meyer all expressed interest.

Pastor Mary reported that she officiated at Communion on March 4, 2007 and at the wedding for Oba Henri Bletch and Allyson Mackenzie Hayes on 2/16/07. Witnesses were Lang Conteh and Renee Meyer; and for Youngkyou Kim and Seo Jin Son, married on 2/24/07; with witnesses Maria Bella and Renee Meyer.

The meeting adjourned with a closing prayer at 8:55 PM.

HISTORY CHANNEL MEETS ST. JAMES JANEY OAKLEY

For the past six months, Janet Oakley and students at Sehome High School have been part of a Save Our History Grant focusing on the preservation of the Territorial Courthouse on E Street through the study of court cases from the 1850s and 1860s. Two of the students are from our own youth here at St. James: Margaret Landis and Sean Keyes.

Margaret has been part of the SOH research group since the beginning last fall and one of the first to post her essay developed from a 1857 court case at Historylink. She will be interviewing Mike Vouri, interpretive ranger from American Camp, in character as Capt George Pickett on March 26th. Her essay is at:
