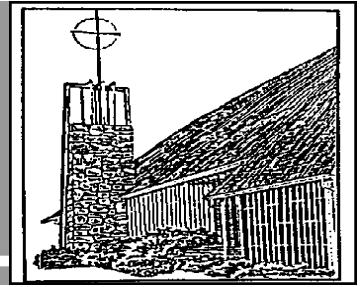

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARY ROBINSON-MOHR

Recently my husband Randy and I drew upon the professional skills of one of our nieces. Boy, did she come through! But how could we thank her for all the work and expertise and time that she gave to us? Words seem inadequate to express our thanks. Gifts and gift certificates can only be an outward show, and they still seem small as far as reflecting our pride in her and our delight over her good work on our behalf.

Have you ever had that dilemma? Someone does something wonderful for you, and no matter what you try to do in response, it just never seems to feel like you've done enough in return. "This is only a small token of our thanks" is one of things people say in such a situation. "I can never repay you for all you have done for me" is another response to a similar situation.

November is the month of Thanksgiving, when we give thanks for the good and sustaining presence of God in our lives. Long ago, the prophet Micah pondered how to give thanks to God. In his view, the people of Israel were taking many of God's blessings and grace for granted, and were downright thankless toward God. Then, in chapter 6 of Micah, he muses about just what kind of a gift one can give to God in order to repay all of the provision and compassion that God bestows. What would be big enough for God? How does one say "thank you" to the God who not only has everything, but who has made everything as well?

Micah knows that some people in his long ago day tried to provide expensive and high quality burnt sacrifices to God. So he suggests to himself that he bring yearling calves for sacrifice to God. But then, that doesn't seem to be a big enough gift to return thanks to the God of life, healing, and wholeness. "What about thousands of rams," he thinks, or even "ten thousands of rivers of oil"? Nothing seems big enough or good enough to give to God as a thank you gift.

Then Micah wonders about his most precious possession: his oldest child. What if he gave his child to God? Is anything too good for God? What can one possibly give to say "Thank you" to God?

You have most likely heard the famous verse that responds to all of Micah's thoughts.

*He has told you, O mortal, what is good;
and what does the LORD require of you
but to do justice, and to love kindness,*

PASTOR MARY AND HER HEALTH

I continue to thank you for your prayers and good thoughts. The migraines continue to ask for my attention for about 12 days out of every 14 days. I will be having a surgery in January that will add a bone graft to a couple of places between my neck vertebrae, and then fuse the vertebrae over a three month period. I'll need to be "down" for about three weeks, then return to work, most probably with a big collar on my neck for a while.

There is no guarantee that this surgery will alleviate any of the migraines. However, it will address the condition of degenerating vertebrae in my neck, as well as the growing pain/weakness in my left side. It will need to be addressed some time anyway, and it means that my days digging and lifting are probably over. Even so, the surgeon is hopeful that there is a 70 to 80 percent chance that a large number of my migraines could be eliminated with this surgery. We won't know until it's done.

In the meantime, thanks for your prayers and compassionate support. You are a most loving congregation!

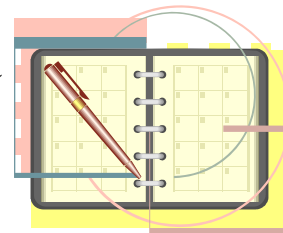

TREASURER'S REPORT SALLY ALBERS

Offerings continued to be strong in September and October. Expenses are slightly below budget, so that we have a positive balance in the General Fund. We appreciate the efforts of the staff and committees to keep costs under control. We should also acknowledge the cheerful giving of our congregation – both the regular contributors, those who give when able, and those organizations who pay to use our church facilities.

The Stewardship campaign kick-off luncheon on October 21st was a delight. The Congregational Life committee provided the gourmet soups, artisan breads and yummy dessert choices. Barb Kilpatrick, Nancy Pace and Phyllis Jones were all busy at the scene - there may have been others helping in the background. THANK YOU – it was really tasty. Pastor Mary, Pastor Tam and (off-stage) Kirsten Rutschman performed an original, light-hearted skit about “making do” with reduced resources. Actually we are planning on having MORE resources in 2008, so I’m looking forward to receiving your pledge forms between now and Dedication Sunday on November 11. Everyone should have their packets by now – if not, call the church office. We have some spares I can deliver to you.

Those who attended know that some tough questions were asked:

Yes, we do plan to hire a custodian to take over the many duties Bill Read has accomplished as a volunteer for the last two years. You may designate a pledge to this purpose, confident that the money will be so used – but the staff position remains a part of the general fund and basic income and expense budget for 2008.

Yes, it is possible to set up an automatic ETF payment if your bank or credit union allows that. Two members already do this and a third uses an internet payment service that mails us a check. I will be working with Peoples Bank to see if we can simplify the process or improve their reporting. In the meantime, it helps if you let me know that you are setting up a payment. At the moment the information that is on our statement doesn't tell me who the money is coming from! But I can have their customer service department research and report it to me.

Yes, the long-term solution to our tight budget woes is to “grow the church”. As you know, enrollment in mainstream churches including Presbyterians has been trending downward for a longtime. The Growth Planning Task Force (GPTF) is a wonderful group of St. James members who are working together to build a framework for our growth. There is no quick fix, however. It may be 5 years before the results begin to show. To my mind, Elder Scott Wenger put it best with the comment that “If they KNEW us, they would love us.” So, I invite you to participate in the solution by inviting friends and family (or even strangers!) to come to services at St James with you.

While I was away for 3 weeks in October, Betty Miller made sure your contributions were deposited into the bank on a timely basis. Marion Dobbie and Renee Meyer recruited additional help to get the stewardship packets printed, assembled, stuffed and addressed. It is amazing that so many individuals magically appear to do whatever needs doing – clear evidence that God works through us to achieve his Purpose.

FROM THE INTERFAITH COALITION

Volunteers needed for severe-weather shelters

Rain arrived earlier this fall than usual. If cold follows suit, then volunteers may be needed soon to help in Interfaith Coalition's severe-weather shelters.

The two shelters --one for women and children at Garden Street United Methodist Church, the other for men at Faith Lutheran Church --provide safety and warmth overnight to homeless individuals when weather conditions could be life-threatening. Shelters are open from 5 p.m. to 8 a.m.

Volunteers staff the shelters in three shifts – an evening check-in, overnight and morning shift. The largest need is for additional volunteers to staff the overnight and morning shifts. Only female volunteers staff the women's shelter, but they also may work at the men's shelter during the check-in and morning shifts. Overnight volunteers do get some sleep. They take turns, while someone is always awake and on duty.

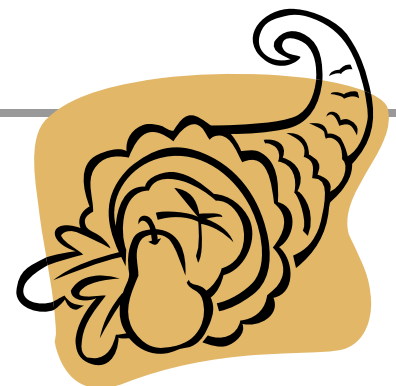

Kits for Children of Iraqi Refugees

Many refugees have fled from the violence of Iraq into surrounding nations. Presbyterians have a chance to help those refugees through the work of the Middle East Council of Churches. Dr. Nuhad Tomeh, who visited St. James last May, is the Presbyterian Church USA's liaison to that Council of Churches. Our Presbytery has taken on a drive to send up to 250 school and health kits for Iraqi refugee children to Dr. Tomeh to be distributed through his office.

A complete kit can be put together for just under \$40, and the list of needed items for a complete kit is outlined below. Tote bags will be available through the church office at a cost of \$2.50, and you can bring a complete kit in a regular grocery bag to the church office, plus \$2.50 for the more durable tote bag that will be required for the kits. Payment for the tote bags can be made payable to St. James Presbyterian Church. Or, you can purchase a tote bag from the church office when they are available, and fill it as directed, then deliver it to the church office.

The Youth of St. James put together 30 school kits for Dr. Tomeh to distribute last spring. Dr. Tomeh sent us pictures of some of the recipients, along with a note of thanks. He said that 30 children from 12 families were helped, "but unfortunately we have opened a door that cannot easily be closed." He went on to say that his office has been inundated with requests for help and for school kits since that time. This is our opportunity to give a much needed gift to people that have lost practically all that they own, and to let them know that Christians in the world care about their well-being. Please support this much needed project as you are able. Many thanks!



School Kit

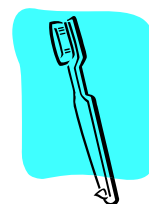
- 1 – pair of blunt scissors (rounded tip)
- 3 – spiral notebooks of 70 to 80 count pages; 8 1/2" x 11" ruled paper (8" x 10 1/2" paper is fine). DO NOT include unbound filler paper.
- 1 – 30 centimeter ruler (12")
- 1 - hand-held pencil sharpener
- 6 – new pencils with erasers (a pack of 10 or 12 is fine)
- 1 – eraser, 2 1/2"
- 1 – box of 24 crayons

Pack all items in cloth tote bag. Cost for the School Kit alone is about \$15. The cloth tote bag costs about \$2.50.

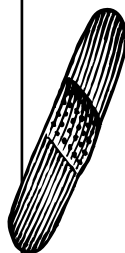


Health Kit

- 1 – brand new hand towel (no fingertip or bath towels)
- 1 – brand new wash cloth
- 1 - wide-tooth comb
- 1 – nail clipper
- 1 – bar of soap (bath sized, in wrapper)
- 1 - toothbrush (in original package)
- 1 – 8 oz. (approximately) tube of toothpaste
- 1 – package of 30 adhesive bandages (band-aids, or others)



Pack all of the Health Kit items in a one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure (like Zip Loc). Then pack the sealed plastic bag in the cloth tote bag with the School Kit items. Cost for the Health Kit alone is about \$22.



The total cost for one complete Children's Kit is about \$39.50.

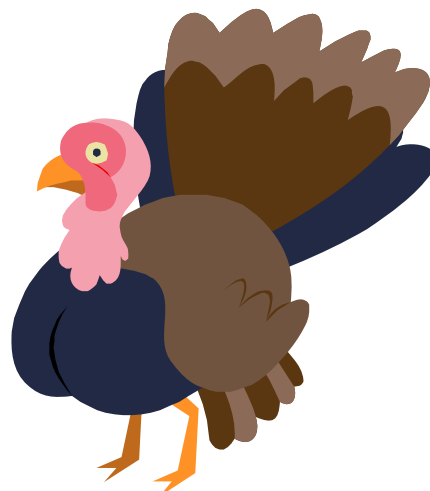

David and Renée Meyer traveled to Chicago in late October for the memorial service of David’s brother’s wife, Melinda Gordon. Many thanks to the members of St. James for their prayers, phone calls, and sympathy cards to the Meyer family during this time. From her obituary, published in the Chicago Tribune:

Melinda K. Gordon, M.D., died of breast cancer on October 24, 2007 at home. ... Melinda rebelled against the notion that cancer is a “blessing in disguise” or ought to improve the patient’s character, for as an oncologist she was well aware that cancer often kills. She rejected “battle” metaphors for cancer, as she felt that it devalued the experience of those who died of cancer by making them into the losers. Cancer to her was instead a thief, stealing the lives and dreams of those it afflicts. She was also adamant that she be able to speak the truth about her experience of cancer rather than play the happy patient.

From the fall of 2005 until just days before her death she was an active contributor to the youngsurvival.org message board for young woman afflicted with cancer. The comments posted before and after her death speak to the value of her presence to the other women on the board. One said, “I think we all immediately moved towards her posts because we knew the tone: always kind, informative, loving, with humor thrown in for good measure. We will truly miss her.” Another said, “I remember posting about a letter someone left me that said ‘chemo makes tumors spread in MICE.’ Melinda replied, ‘YOU AREN'T A MOUSE.’ I read her comment, laughed, turned off my computer and had a great day.” Melinda was 37 years old.

HOW ABOUT WITH A ST. JAMES

The Christian Education Committee Wants to Know if You Are Interested!



Possible Saint James Study Tour of Israel and Palestine, 2008 or 2009

THE LOWDOWN:

The time of year and the length of the trip will be decided by those who are interested in traveling. We want to make the trip available to the most people at the convenience of their vacation availability and their schedule and the time their finances are available. Most probably the trip will be between 2 or 3 weeks in length.

Cost of the trip will depend upon the length of the trip, the time of year of the trip, as well as airfare, rental vehicles, hotel and food costs. A good part of the trip may be in the guest houses of kibbutzes. These Israeli farms are an economical way to travel, yet still have a basic and comfortable, air-conditioned room with a private bathroom. Kibbutzes are also a good place to meet Israelis and have informal conversations with them. A two week tour can most probably be arranged for \$2,600 to \$3000 per person.

The format of the tour will include visits mostly to Biblical sites in the Galilee and Nazareth area and the northern sections, and then in Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and environs. Also included will be visits to projects such as the ministries of the Arab Orthodox Society, the Sind-yanna fair trade project, and other contemporary Christian ministries. There will be opportunities to informally meet both Israelis and Palestinians. We will strike a balance between seeing the ancient stones but also the “living stones” of the Holy Land. Those traveling will be asked for input on the choice of sites visited, as we want to try to include places that St. James folks have always wanted to see, at least as far as it is feasible.

The tour will also be contingent upon the political situation of the area. Travelers will be strongly encouraged to buy trip insurance in the event that an early departure from Israel is necessitated, or even a cancellation.

Leadership of the tour will be Pastor Mary. There is a possibility that Dr. Jodi Magness may be able to join us for portions of the tour, based upon her availability.

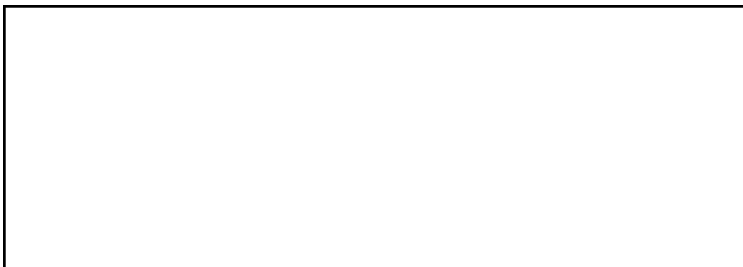
