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A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JERRY POOLE

Dear Friends:

I've been thinking about you and about my role in your lives at St James. It would be easy to think of my writing these articles each month as part of the routine of the work of a pastor. Preach the sermons, teach the classes, train officers and leaders, oversee the administration of the church. But that would miss the point. The point is that none of it is routine! Each sermon is different from every other. Hopefully I'm growing and changing with each passing year. Aren't you? My role is clearly not one of routine leadership. It is to point us to Jesus, to remind you (and me, at the same time) that the foremost focus of our lives is to deepen our relationship with God as revealed in Jesus Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit. Many of us walk through life, going-through-the-motions, presuming that whatever level of relationship we had with God last year is plenty good enough to sustain us in this New Year. But that's far less than best unless our goal is to keep our distance from God. Our Creator wants us continually to be available to get better acquainted with Jesus each day, each week, each year than we were before. It can be like meeting a friend and wanting to get to know that person better each time we talk, not being content to leave that relationship where it was last time for that would be stagnation. Except that when we get closer to Jesus we get better, to-

ward being the best people we can be. Not everyone wants that, however, do you?

This month we have some events coming which will provide us opportunities to grow closer to God. Will we take advantage of them?

On Feb 17 we'll launch into Lent with an Ash Wednesday service of worship. That will be a brief (45 minutes or so) service of scripture readings, singing and prayers to help us start well the forty day (not counting Sundays) season of Lent. Lent is a designated period of time set aside for us to reflect on Jesus' life on earth, to help us grow closer to him so that we may better comprehend the truth and reality of his suffering and sacrifice on our behalf three days before Easter when he arose from the dead. If you have never attended an Ash Wednesday service, I DARE you to come this year! It's one of my favorites. You'll be glad you did. We will learn more about Lent in the coming weeks.

On Feb 18-21 we are invited to spend three plus days (or whatever portions we have available) at Tall Timber Ranch, our Presbyterian camp and conference center located near Leavenworth. We will not have a formal program, but rather will have a variety of individual and group activities available for our participation. I expect to be there for a day or two and

then return for Sunday worship at St James on the 21st.

On Feb 21 we'll observe Freedom Sunday. Our session has proclaimed that day so we may learn about the struggle against human trafficking going on in other parts of the world. We may learn about ways we can help.

On Wednesday Feb 24 I'll begin teaching a six week one-hour noon-time discussion study of the biblical book of Ephesians. The apostle Paul wrote that letter to the people who lived in and around Ephesus. This book has riches to communicate to us and enormous encouragement. Is there anyone who does not need to be encouraged? It will not be a lecture, but rather an inductive discussion study. I invite any and all of you to join me. If meeting at noon on Wednesdays is impossible for you but you want to participate, please suggest an alternative time that you would attend and perhaps I can accommodate you by teaching a second class at the time you prefer.

This month we have many opportunities to get better acquainted with God as revealed in his son Jesus by the power of the Spirit. Will we take advantage of them?

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SJPC Lenten Meditation Booklet for 2010

It's time to consider writing a short missive for the Lenten Meditation Booklet. We are using fifteen scriptures and you may write up to 200 words on one or more of them. This way we will have more than one response to each Bible verse, reflecting our various experiences and points of view. To have one for each day, we need 61 entries. Don't be shy. However, many meditations are written, that's how long the book will be. If as sometimes happens, you have a scripture you would like to use, then that's good too. You may also tell me what day you would like to have your entry posted between January 31 and April 18th. Remember drawings and photos are also good to submit.

Here are the fifteen verses to choose from:

- **Acts of the Apostles 4:31** When they had prayed, the place in which they were gathered together was shaken; and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke the word of God with boldness.
- **1 John 2:17** And the world and its desire are passing away, but those who do the will of God live forever.
- **John 14:1** "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me.
- **Psalms 145: 2, 4** Every day I will bless you, and praise your name forever and ever. One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts.
- **1 Corinthians 15:10** But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain.
- **Mark 11:24** So I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours.
- **Mark 9: 36-37** Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me."
- **Leviticus 19:33-34** ... the strangers who sojourn with you shall be to you as the natives among you, and you shall love them as yourself; for you were strangers in the land of Egypt.
- **1 John 3:17-18** How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses to help? Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action.
- **Matthew 6:22** 'The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light;
- **Matthew 13:15** For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are hard of hearing, and they have shut their eyes; so that they might not look with their eyes, and listen with their ears, and understand with their heart and turn—and I would heal them."
- **Mark 11:25** 'Whenever you stand praying, forgive, if you have anything against anyone; so that your Father in heaven may also forgive you your trespasses.'*
- **Luke 18:1** Then Jesus* told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart.
- **Micah 6: 8** And what does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?
- **1 Peter 1:7** ...so that the genuineness of your faith - being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire - may be found to result in praise and glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed.

Tall Timber Retreat Info Sheet

Where is Tall Timber Ranch?

27875 White River Road, Leavenworth - Drive Highway 2 from Everett to the Lake Wenatchee turnoff, 20 miles east of the Steven's Pass summit. Drive around Lake Wenatchee (Hwy. 207 for 10.4 mi.) to the far end and turn right onto the White River Road. Camp is 6 miles up the White River Road. www.talltimber.org

Who can come?

Everyone is welcome! Please feel free to bring along a friend or family member. Do not think you are too old or young to come along; you can always relax and enjoy the beautiful views from the lodge if you are not feeling energetic.

When is it?

Thursday February 18th through Sunday February 21st. We will carpool from the church Thursday morning, approximately 10:30am. On Sunday we will leave after a delicious brunch, approximately 12pm.

How much is it?

\$95 - \$103/ per person for the weekend, including food and lodging

\$47.50 - \$51.50 for children 5-10

Children 4 and under are free (but still included in the count)

An optional winter recreation fee adds \$10 per person for the weekend if you would like to use the tube hill, skate park, or borrow snow shoes or cross country skis.



What do we do there?



Activities include:

- cross country skiing through the lovely mountainous countryside
- snowshoeing through the wilderness
- sliding down the tube hill on inner tubes (under supervision)
- Snow skate park – use skateboard-like snow decks to navigate the rails and jumps
- playing cards or board games in the lodge (or working on a group puzzle)
- relaxing in the lodge with a good book or just sitting around and chatting with hot chocolate or tea
- informal Sunday worship service

Accommodations:

All meals are provided. You will be asked to sign up to help with setting up or cleaning up (but not cooking), probably for just one meal for the weekend, depending on how many people we have.



Most of the cabins sleep about 14 and have electric heating and bathrooms, but smaller single family cabins are also available if you don't mind not having a bathroom in your cabin – there are showers in the lodge. The cabins have cushioned beds, but you will need to bring your own towels and bedding (sleeping bags or blankets & pillows).

PULSE**Financial report for December 30, 2009** Sally Albers, Treasurer**General Fund 01**

- 1) Income for the month totaled \$13,915.66, under budget by \$6,202.34. The budget appears to have been unrealistic – as December 2008 income was \$12,628. Our total income was \$191,764.49, exceeding 2008 by \$3,856. A 2% increase.
- 2) Expenses totaled \$16,122.95, over budget for the month. However, expenses for the year totaled \$191,139 which was less than 2008 and left a small positive balance in the General Fund.
- 3) In December Session approved Mission committee plans to disburse unspent local benevolence and any positive ending balance of the general fund at year-end.
- 4) General Fund balance is now a positive \$611.15. The unspent \$250 of Local Benevolence 2009 budget was transferred to Mission committee to be included with the January distribution.

Designated Giving/Named Activities Fund 02

- 1) December had special collections. We received \$1585 for Christmas Joy, \$145 the youth group's "Goats", \$255 for Habitat for Humanity appeal, and \$380 for the Angel Tree program.
- 2) We also received \$1,123 in grant money from the PC(USA) for a special literacy outreach to Spanish and Chinese language speakers in our area. Carla Shafer applied for the grant and will be administrating the new program.
- 3) Checks were issued to PCUSA for Peacemaking Offering \$1209, Church World Service \$165, Blaine Food Bank \$168.50, Bellingham Food Bank \$462.35, and Angel Tree gifts \$263.15. Other payments were \$162.34 for a St. James camera out of undesignated memorials, and \$75 for a high chair and \$119.34 for the 120th birthday party tent rental – both from designated giving for these purposes.

Endowments at New Covenant Funds

During December our 3 endowment funds all earned dividends as shares for the 4th quarter of the year:

- 1) Facilities earned \$2,676 in the 4th quarter, and \$14,519 for the year; the value of our holdings increased by \$3,731 in the quarter, and \$104,344 for the year. We were thus "up" \$118,864 and disbursed \$14,910 for a net increase of \$103,954.
- 2) Music increased by \$1,150 of which \$150 was dividend income in the year.
- 3) Christian Ed/Youth increased by \$3,443 of which \$421 was dividend income.

Planning for 2010

I would like to encourage all our members to contribute \$49.35 in per capita early this year. This is a fair assessment of the "per head" costs of the administrative support provided by Presbytery, Synod and the Presbyterian Church (USA).

As you might expect, the bulk of the charge is \$37.74 for support of North Puget Sound Presbytery - since they have the fewest number of heads to take a share of the costs. The Synod and General Assembly assess the remaining \$11.61. The total **\$49.35** is the same as last year, out of their efforts to hold down costs.

I'm sure you are all aware of the help we have had from Dr. Corey Schlosser-Hall, Dean Strong, and other members of Presbytery during the last two years. They, along with retired ministers Erv Roorda and Paul Jensen, have frequently come to Bellingham to advise and serve us during this interim period - at no charge and to our very great benefit.

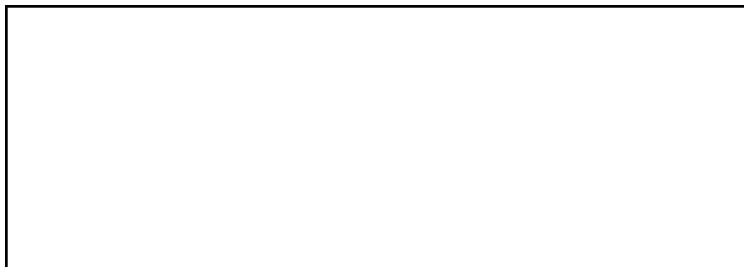
