LEAN IN

Greetings! At the close of January 2019, St. James Presbyterian held our Annual Congregational Meeting. We heard reports of the good work God is doing in our midst and listened to presentations of how our church leadership plans to invest and develop this work in the coming year. This year, the Session presented a deficit budget, making space for growth and God's abundant provision by investing in the future with the excess giving we have accumulated in years past.

A phrase kept finding its way into the conversation: "Lean in." What does it mean to "lean in"? Is this just a catchy phrase? A few years back, Sheryl Sandberg, COO of Facebook, wrote a book entitled *Lean In*. In her book, Sandberg used the phrase to speak about being present and engaged as a high-achieving leader. We've picked these words up and made common use of them in our daily interactions. So, what does it mean? And what does it mean in the context of the church?

I want to connect *lean in* with a word and concept peppered throughout the Scriptures: $\dot{\epsilon}\gamma\gamma\dot{\epsilon}\zeta\omega$ (transliterated engizo); it means to "draw close" or "come near" or "approach". Jesus uses this word when he talks about how the Kingdom of God is "at hand" — it's $\dot{\epsilon}\gamma\gamma\dot{\epsilon}\zeta\omega$. It is approaching, imminent, near. It comes from the sense of a time arriving or coming into proximity of a place or person. $\dot{\epsilon}\gamma\gamma\dot{\epsilon}\zeta\omega$ is to, in our vernacular, "lean in."

Leaning in is about turning attention, taking steps forward, and coming into closer proximity with the object of our focus. For us, in the context of mission, vision, and planning, "leaning in" looks like

coming closer to one another in support of the important initiatives we are engaging as a church. In particular, we sense a call to "lean in" and expand our support of children and families in our church. We sense the call to "lean in" to financially support staff and programs that give dedicated time and energy to doing just that. We want to lean towards providing support to the particular needs of the little ones among us (of which there are a growing number — Hooray!).

When Jesus speaks of the Kingdom's closeness and coming, he invites his followers to draw near in hope and anticipation: the Kingdom of God is at hand. It's like he's saying, "Hey, come in close, pay attention, things are about to get really good!"

This is our calling and this is what we are encouraged to do: lean in this year at St. James. Certainly, that has to do with our financial giving — as we propose a budget with a deficit, we hope you will engage in the ways you can to meet that faithfully-set goal. But it also means drawing near in the ways you participate — are you called to lead, are you called to give time, are you called to join in this good work? Yes, yes, yes. So the invitation is to lean in to that calling, to embrace it, and to discover that crackle of anticipation as we partner in what God is doing together. Lean in.

Pruning

My orchid sat on top of the fridge, buried in dust behind a roommate's Tupperware. A rough fall had knocked it out of its pot and it hadn't bloomed since. Aw, what the heck - I took the orchid down from the fridge and put it in the window. Some would say it was a lateral move. I was in grad school and didn't have much more to give. Maybe an ice cube or two.

A friend once told me that if you love something you have to let it go. "If it's meant to be, it will come back to you..." she shrugged and started talking about something else. The conversation might have moved on, but her words took root in my heart. I knew what I had to do.

Some early pruning experiences had taught me that the hardest part of any bad trim is the grow-out phase. It wasn't pretty, but I was starting to trust the process. I grabbed a pair of scissors from the kitchen drawer and held the stem in my hands. I'll take it down to the base and give it a new lease on life. I carefully took the stem in my hands, ready to make start fresh. As I did, the stem came into focus, and so did three little buds.

What? I had been so engrossed with death that I couldn't see life that was right before my eyes. My plant had already begun its miracle comeback, now I just had to wait.

Purging

We've all had those years. I can't put it into words, but you know what I mean. At the end of one of those years, my next door neighbor knocked on my door. "We're doing some remodeling and ordered a dumpster. There's no way we're going to fill it, so feel free to throw in whatever you want."

Nothing could have wrapped up a year of Virginia Slims and Coors Light better than a dump run, and in this case, the dump came to me. I went downstairs and sat on my bed. It was like winning the lotto, I didn't know where to start.

Soon, I was making my last walk-through. That same orchid, once revived, had since died and sat lifeless on the kitchen table. It felt a little too real. Why was I carrying around this dead orchid thinking it would ever bloom again? "I'm not moving this orchid into the next chapter of my life, I've had enough," I resolved.

I tucked the orchid under my arm and headed towards the door when the word mercy stopped me in my tracks. I don't know why or how. Was it the voice of God?

I looked down at the orchid. Her leaves were withered and leathery, her exposed roots were black and lifeless. There is no way this orchid could live again.

I put the orchid back on the kitchen table. It was not a grand gesture of hope, but a quiet act of surrender; I didn't choose the orchid, but I chose to relent.

FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN

Whatcom County Mobile Food Pack Family Life Center at Birchwood Presbyterian Church 400 Meadowbrook Court, Bellingham, WA

What is *Feed My Starving Children* (FMSC) all about? It is a Christian non-profit organization that is committed to feeding God's starving children throughout the world. The event, "Whatcom County Mobile Pack", will be hosted at the Family Life Center at Birchwood Presbyterian Church. Children and adults will hand pack nutritious meals designed specially for starving children. Each volunteer will work a 2-hour shift and can donate financially as well. FMSC will be on-site to help organize and carry out the two-day event. They will bring all the food, supplies and truck for transporting.

700 volunteers are required to pack 130,000 meals. The total cost for this event is \$30,000 (\$0.22 a meal). We will work with other churches, service organizations, businesses, schools and Christian organizations in Whatcom County. Can you imagine the impact this will have as an outreach in our community and fulfill one of God's greatest wishes to help feed starving children throughout the world?

FMSC was founded in 1987 and has served 70 countries by working with 88 world-wide Christian organizations to distribute the food packs. Over the past 12 years they have received a 4-star rating with Charity Navigator. Visit the FMSC website at www.fmsc.org/about-us and you will be inspired to participate when you see for yourself how the program is carried out.

We ended the year with an excess of \$1,271 instead of a deficit of almost \$10,000. If you are contributing using online procedure, be sure that you are paying the fee and not having it passed on to St. James.
