THE JOURNEY SO FAR

It's April! Spring is here, the weather is getting warmer, Spring Break has started, and we are only halfway through Lent. The Easter celebrations seem far off, yet our Lenten journey continues.

We set out in this season of focus and discipline with the end in mind. We fix our eyes on the cross and the empty tomb, expecting the hope of resurrection. We anticipate the goodness of the destination — the celebration of restoration and the start of new life that comes as we experience God's mercy and grace in our lives. But what about the midpoint?

What happens part-way through the journey? How are we supposed to live at the place along the road where we start to think it would be better turn back, give up, or go another direction? As much as I want to celebrate the hope of the destination, I know in my own journey of faith, the days are actually mostly filled with midway stations, stopping-off points where I have to catch my breath, take stock of my surroundings, and make a choice about whether or not I will continue onward.

Embrace the length of the journey and take stock of where you are. What has already begun to shift in you? What has been challenging about the Lenten work? What has God revealed to you thus far...can you name it, give thanks, and still hope for more?

I look back on these first two years as the pastor of St. James and marvel at how much we have grown and accomplished together. We are on this journey as a congregation. We started but are very much still pilgrims on the way, set out for a destination of renewed life together and revitalized commitment to our mission and purpose of being the presence of Christ in our world.

As I pause to reflect on the journey thus far, I am grateful for how God has woven our lives together. I reflect on all that God has taught me personally, and us communally, along this first leg of the journey. We have developed our children's and family programs; served with Family Promise; renewed our collaboration with our Presbyterian family; and added new bathrooms, new staff, and new faces! Like any rewarding journey, I look back with wonder on all that God has done in our midst.

And at this waypoint, I also look ahead to all that is to come. Hope is on the horizon. We have work to do together: refining our mission and purpose; hiring new staff as we bless and send others on to new chapters of life; fresh service opportunities in our community with schools and neighbors..the list goes on. We have not yet arrived, God has much in store for us.

This is the beauty of the journey of faith: at each midpoint, there is the expectation of what is to come. When the disciples arrive at the empty tomb of Easter Sunday, they begin to realize that the journey is far from over. Truly, the journey has only begun. Onward.
