FOSTERING RESILIENCE

This past year, I have had the honor of diving into a cohort of other Pacific Northwest pastors in the launch of a leadership development program at The Seattle School of Theology & Psychology. The Resilient Leadership Project explores how pastoral leaders practice resilience and sustainability in their work so that they and the organizations they serve can flourish and thrive.

What is resilience? I define resilience as the ability to dynamically live in a changing world: the ability to adapt and weather the storms of life. Resilience is a way of sustainable living in an era of scarce resources. It's the firm foundation of faith in Christ along the pilgrim way.

How do we foster resilience in our lives and communities? How do we, as a church, develop our capacity to weather storms and celebrate joys together? We need *people, practices,* and *purpose* to support us, ground us, and guide us. I'd like to explore these each a bit, thinking about our life together at St. James.

First, we need **people**. We need people in our lives that we belong to. Think about your support network in our community of fellow Christ-followers and in your homes, neighborhoods, and businesses. We have greater resilience when we feel like we belong to these folks. These are the people we reach out to help in times of need. They are the same people we share our joys with. I hold deep hope that we are strengthening the bonds of relationship with one another in order to foster this kind of community in our church — may we be each other's people as we journey.

Second, spiritual **practices** help strengthen our resilience. There are many ways that we practice together as a church: regularly gathering for fellowship and worship; the grounding and centering practices of prayer and repentance; actively pursuing peacemaking and service; approaching Christ's Table in a posture of remembrance; and creating space for gratitude. We practice together so that we might be formed and rooted together in God's abiding love — may we find our grounding and foundation in God's truth and goodness; may we be sustained for the long haul.

Finally, we engage discernment of **purpose** in order to stay the course amid all that comes our way. Purpose is something we have to pursue together: finding our purpose requires listening collectively and taking intentional steps forward as a body. Purpose helps us consider the who, what, where, when, why and how of our life together. At the most essential level, as the church, our Purpose is to love the Lord our God with all our soul, heart, mind, and strength and love our neighbors as we love ourselves. — may the work of finding our collective purpose stem from this foundation.

May marks the final month of the Resilient Leadership project and the end of my work with this cohort. While this project comes to a close, the work of resilience continues. I am grateful for this opportunity to learn and grow with others; I am learning how to create sustainable ways of serving our congregation that I hope will allow me to participate in our work together for many years to come. I look forward to deepening our resilience as a community as we move into all the ways God is calling us to serve, love, and grow as we engage our faith and lives alongside one another.

NATIVE LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

The St. James Mission and Social Action Committee has introduced a Land Acknowledgement Statement:

We acknowledge, with respect, that the land we are on today is the traditional and ancestral homelands of the Lummi and Nooksack Nations and peoples. This was also a site of trade, gathering, and healing for numerous other Native tribes. We recognize the Indigenous peoples as original stewards of this land and all the relatives within it. As these words of acknowledgment are read, spoken and heard, the ties Nations have to their traditional homelands are renewed and reaffirmed.

Why would we do this? By acknowledging that we are living a Native lands, we show respect for Native American nations' and peoples' traditions that continue to serve the earth and support community well-being. General Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and its predecessors have affirmed the sovereignty and treaty rights of Native American tribes on numerous occasions. For example, the 193rd General Assembly (1981) of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America called the President of the United States to develop "a national Indian policy that is consistent with the concerns of Indian people for self-determination, tribal sovereignty, economic self-sufficiency, and preservation of treaty rights."

A comprehensive policy, Churchwide Conversation on Race, Ethnicity, Racism, and Ethnocentricity was approved by the 222nd General Assembly (2016) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), includes a repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery and a call to study the doctrine and its implications

Eight synods (including ours) within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) have some form of Native American Ministry in their bounds. Most PC(USA) Native American churches are located on reservation and trust lands. The majority of churches do not have full time clergy. Most of the churches are small in membership and continue to be served in various ways. PCUSA has always stood with Native Americans and at the last General Assembly, the U.S. Department of Arts and Culture - "a people-powered, grassroots, action network that incites creativity and social imagination to shape a

culture of empathy, equity, and belonging" - offers this explanation for why the Land Acknowledgement statement needs to happen:

- · Offer recognition and respect.
- · Counter the "doctrine of discovery" with the true story of the people who were already here.
- · Create a broader public awareness of the history that has led to this moment.
- · Begin to repair relationships with Native communities and with the land.
- · Support larger truth-telling and reconciliation efforts.
- Remind people that colonization an ongoing process, with Native lands still occupied due to deceptive and broken treaties.
 - Take a cue from Indigenous protocol, opening up space with reverence and respect.
 - Inspire ongoing action and relationship.

Posting the statement of Land Acknowledgment by itself is a small gesture. It becomes meaningful when coupled with authentic relationship and informed action. But this beginning can be an opening to greater consciousness of Native sovereignty and cultural rights, a step toward equitable relationship and reconciliation." The Mission and Social Action committee members invite you to join us with your support.

Spring has sprung! We had a great April with a wonderful Easter celebration!


A huge thank you to everyone who helped with the Easter egg hunt after our Easter service, either by donating candy, or stuffing and hiding eggs. We had a great turnout!

Your participation helped raise just over \$245,000 – an incredible amount that way surpassed our goal for the evening! This means that we can continue to work hard to ensure that every child and their family has a safe home at the end of the day, and that no one is cold or hungry in our community.

As a member of Interfaith Coalition, you have been a vital partner in bringing shelter, stability, and hope to many in our community, and you helped launch our Family Promise program in April 2018 to help more families transition out of homelessness. As we celebrate the first year, we want to **thank you** for your immense support as a Host/Support Congregation, and for your continued faith and work in this mission of service to families in need. You have been the face of love and compassion to many.

Here is a look at what you helped Family Promise accomplish this first year: 18 families served, representing 67 people (44 were children); 10 families found better employment, 10 families received better healthcare, 13 families received financial literacy training, and families spent an average of 7.5 weeks in the program before moving to stable housing. So far, 850 volunteers have been trained.
