Faithful Listening

"To whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life and we have believed and come to know that you are the Holy One of God." (John 6:68)

The disciples were at an impasse. They had begun to witness the miraculous work of Jesus, journeying with him along the road and seeing great multitudes fed and healed. And yet, his words made many uncomfortable. They challenged the status quo and made many

question all they had held dear, perhaps to be forsaken for this Way that Jesus was inviting them to embark on.

Jesus turns to them and asks plainly: "Do you wish to go away?" He offers them an out. And the Apostle Peter replies plainly with the statement above: No Lord, we've heard about life from you, the Holy One of God. Even as Jesus' words have challenged him, Peter wants to stay and listen and find life with Jesus.

Listening faithfully is not an easy task. It is much simpler to step away, to choose a path of less resistance, making our own choices, trusting in ourselves alone. To listen well to the words of God is to be impacted, to be challenged, to see the world reframed and be called out of the places of death we have settled in. To listen is to embrace the possibility that we might hear God's stirring voice and have to act.

It can be difficult to listen well as individuals and it is most certainly difficult to listen well together as a community. As a leader, I am tempted (and give in more often than I'd like to admit) to listen to my own voice or just a few trusted others instead of exploring what God is actually saying in community. It is easier to make decisions myself than it is to invite discussion, conversation, and the potential for dissonance that comes with communal listening. I will confess I have done these in my calling here at St. James and I long to get better at this, to invite more voices in, to listen better to the way God's Spirit is speaking among us.

When we listen to our own voice alone, we deny the opportunity for the words of eternal life that come from the Holy One to be spoken to us in fresh ways. We miss out on how God might speak through an unexpected mouthpiece. And in the process, people are hurt or spurned.

But, when we invite a community of voices, each carefully listening for what God is saying in and through them, we learn to hold the space of difference. In this, we invite the possibility that God's voice might show up in unexpected places and very often discover that new perspectives, fresh expressions, and transformative movements of God's spirit occur. Listening well, in community, is a practice we are founded upon as a Presbyterian Church. Our polity and governance is designed to lead us into faithful listening together. We are invited to tune in to what God is saying in ourselves, pray for discernment to know what is us and what is the nudging of the Spirit, and then share and listen as a gathered body to find out the way the Spirit is leading us.

As a congregation, we have many things ahead of us that we will need to discern, be they ministry endeavors, building projects, acts of justice in the community, or fresh ways to teach God's good news. Any healthy, thriving, welcoming, hopeful community must do this. And when we engage all that the Spirit is doing among us from a posture of faithful listening, we open ourselves to experiencing the presence of the Holy One of God in our midst. In the gathering of God's people, who have turned their hearts into God's voice and are listening patiently, God will speak.

We pray: Holy One of God, you have those words of eternal life and we wait patiently for you to speak them to us. Come, Spirit of God. Amen and amen.

From Music Director Carolyn Mullen

In June of 1998, you hired me as your Contemporary Service Music leader. Working with Pastor Mary Robinson-Mohr, pianist Bev Sherman and bassist Erin Wells, we enjoyed creating uplifting worship for the 8:30 am worship service. By September of that year, I was asked to lead the Chancel and Bell Choirs as well. The Chancel Choir was welcoming and eager, making me feel right at home. Dr. Les Belrose, the incredibly talented Organist and accompanist, helped me learn the Presbyterian way of worship. Though I had little bell choir experience, David and Brian Seater educated me in all things bells. Those first few years the bell choir was mostly kids, including young-at-heart Peg Wilke and Bill Read.

My first impression of St. James was friendliness. One of the first weeks I worked for you, I received a very sweet thank you note from Bob Monihan. This had never happened before. I was humbled. Through these 21 years, you helped me grow in music-making. Your involvement in local charities and concerns inspired me to give to our community as well.

The Chancel and Bell Choir members truly feel like family. The support, caring, FUN we have together is such a blessing. We have endured everything from trying to sing with incense smoking around us as we held a "14th St" combined Ash Wednesday service with Sacred Heart parish to working with 10, yes, 10 accompanists. Bells, well, bells...absolutely some of my most enjoyable music experience, even in the dark,



when you can't quite see your music, or when it's blowing off your stand, or you play the A flat instead of A sharp. All of you talented musicians have a special place in my heart – you are certainly gifts from God.

While everyone has given so much, I want to especially thank; Bea Aubert, who would phone those who missed Thursday's rehearsals to make sure they were ok — and, "by the way, when will you be back at choir?"; Don & Jill Hoyt, who followed me to St James from the Lutheran part of town; Jim Gresham, who can step in at the drop of a hat to direct any choir; Randy Bowers and Pat Nelson for helping with pianist duties; everyone who has supplied special music over the summers; and Jenny Sue LeSchander, my right hand gal, always ready and willing to step in to do most anything to help. I will certainly treasure our Thursday night rehearsals. Beware, perhaps I'll have time to write that "You Wouldn't Believe What Happens at Church Choir Rehearsal" book.

I've enjoyed working with so many of you at the Women's events – the rummage sale, Arts & Crafts Faire, luncheons, receptions and dinners, and

with the Worship, Flower and Sacristy committees. Blessed with saints at work around here.

My future plans: Though Jim and I are not retiring from our day jobs for a year or two, we plan to visit our Oregon Coast cabin just south of Lincoln City as often as possible. (Visit us!). My extra time will be spent on

a life-long dream of creating visual art via mixed media, collage, and sculpture. We will now have more opportunities to visit our far-flung kids (former bell choir members!) – Zach & wife Julie in Prague, Czech Republic and Dr. Keena in Raleigh, NC.

Undoubtedly, new musical adventures will appear. Our Oregon neighborhood has a monthly jazz band jam session that may have me playing piano and singing!

Creating music in serving God's church has blessed me with 38 ½ years at three churches; St. Paul's Episcopal in Mount Vernon, Central Lutheran in Bellingham, and St. James. I have been encouraged and energized by eight Pastors, four Interim Pastors, 10 intern pastors. (Yikes! Thank you, Lord, for patience!) But I am most thankful for the "people in the pews", your constant, loving support, and the meaningful worship we have experienced together. -Carolyn Mullen

On June 2nd and June 9th. Each year on Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church.
