
Once again we have celebrated Easter, the Church's annual proclamation of its most astounding claim: "Christ is risen!" Life, not death, has the final word. A website called Patheos, which hosts conversations about faith, this year invited some of their favorite Christian bloggers to answer the question, "Why I Need the Resurrection." Following are two of the responses.

Kara Root, a Presbyterian pastor in Minneapolis, wrote:

I need the Resurrection
because my sister is sick
and can't afford insurance,
because I've told a weeping Haitian mom,
"No, I can't take your son home with me."
because I've been rushed off a Jerusalem street
so a robot could blow up a bag that could've blown
up us.
because I've exploded
in rage
and watched their tiny faces cloud with hurt.
because evil is pervasive
and I participate.
I need the Resurrection
because it promises
that in the end
all wrongs are made right.
Death loses.
Hope triumphs.
And Life and Love
Prevail.

Another response came from Jim Ward, Rector of an Episcopal church in California:

"I'm not so sure that I need the resurrection as that I need the God that only the resurrection reveals. What the resurrection shows us is not so much how like God Jesus is, as how like Jesus God



is. The basic affirmation of Easter ("Christ is Risen") means that if you want to know what God is like, look at Jesus. So all of our frantic attempts to silence the truth are forgiven by the very truth we've stamped out. It means God loves us so much that not even our killing him will keep him from reconciling us."

Whether our responses arise, like Kara's, from experiences that make us recognize the reality of evil and acknowledge our own part in it, or they result, like Jim's, from cerebral reflections on what the resurrection says about God—they all seem to arrive at the same place. They all affirm the power of grace, the sureness of love, the reasonableness of hope, the triumph of life. Grace. Love. Hope. Life. Why do you need the resurrection this year? May you know its power in your own life.

Caring for God's Creation – Saint James Earth Day Sunday Worship Service and Related Events Sunday, April 24, 2016

A schedule of worship and informational activities has been planned to inspire and to invite consideration. The event is coordinated by the Mission and Social Action Committee. All events are open to the public, so invite your neighbors!

9:00am Walking the Labyrinth with the theme of Caring about God's creation at Fairhaven Park

10:30am Morning Worship – Pastor Janet preaching in the St. James pulpit on an Earth Day theme.

12:00pm Lunch and Earth Care Information Event in the Fellowship Hall – for members and open to the public.

A simple lunch will be provided free of charge.

The effects of climate change are hardest on the poor. We have two concerns as Christians: How we care for the created earth and how we care for each other. There will be presentations (about 30 minutes each) and a moderated discussion to elicit what our current understanding of our situation is and to consider questions and the hopes of those attending.

The Earth Care Information Event will be an opportunity for us to hear how one Presbyterian woman through her love, faith, and energy responded to reducing carbon emissions on our planet. Abby Brockway, an Elder at Woodland Park Presbyterian Church will talk about her experiences as a person of faith taking a stand on reducing our dependence on coal and oil. Abby took action in ways that we might not, but her spiritual path is very like our own. How did she hear God's word and what will happen now? Presbyterians for Earth Care, a national coalition of interested members and churches, celebrate her journey.

Eddy Ury, Clean Energy Organizer of RE sources for Sustainable Communities, will give an update of the

local situation in Whatcom County and Washington State. He will give information about what seems to be at stake and how government and corporations might be responsive.

Information will be exhibited about what local citizens are doing to simplify, increase recycling and reduce one's carbon footprint. Many individuals at St. James take action every day and if you would like to share how you have changed behaviors to care for creation, we are collecting stories. Here at St. James our church has been responsive in practical ways to caring for creation. The Building and Grounds committee has made electrical and plumbing upgrades that are less polluting or more efficient. We have introduced recycling and green composting for all building users. Our coffee is fair trade, equal exchange coffee grown by a PCUSA Development of the People project. 2016 IS ENERGY YEAR IN BELLINGHAM HELP BELLINGHAM WIN A \$5 MILLION DOLLAR PRIZE

Bellingham is ranked 8th out of 50 finalists in the Georgetown University Energy Prize competition. In support of efforts to save energy, address climate change and increase the use of renewable energy sources, Bellingham is partnering with utility companies, nonprofits and local businesses. Residents can create a free online account at BellinghamEnergyPrize.org and set up a plan to make energy-efficient changes, many of which are simple adjustments. The goal is to get 5,000 homes into the program.



Recertification as an Earth Care Congregation!

Dear Saint James Presbyterian Church,

Congratulations on your recertification as an Earth Care Congregation! The commitment that your church continues to show for caring for God's earth is an inspiration, and your ministry is appreciated. Thank you for all you have done since your earth care journey was first recognized in 2013. Enclosed is a certificate affirming your status as an Earth Care Congregation until February 2017.

Celebrating tremendous growth in PC(USA) Earth Care Congregations, we are now using a more streamlined effort to serve the growing number of congregations. The next application cycle will be January 1 – February 15, 2017. We will certify/recertify all congregations who submit applications during those 6 weeks and meet the criteria. The application will again be in Excel spreadsheet format; thanks to feedback this year, we will try to work out some of the kinks before then and will be available to help with the technology if needed.

Environmental Ministries is housed under the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and we believe that hunger, poverty, and environmental destruction are linked areas of concern, constantly interacting and impacting one another. We are including a sample of the *PHP Post*, which you will receive quarterly. If you prefer to view it only online, please email php@pcusa.org to let us know not to send the printed copy.

As an Earth Care Congregation, your church may use the Earth Care Congregations seal to promote your commitment to earth care on your website, the church newsletter, t-shirts, etc. until the date that the certification expires. The Earth Care Congregations seal will be sent via email.

Environmental Ministries will notify your presbytery of your recertification as an Earth Care Congregation, and your church will continue to be listed as an Earth

Care Congregation on the Environmental Ministries website.

If anyone active in earth care in your church would like to sign up for the Environmental Ministries Action Network (EMAN), we would welcome your participation. The goal of EMAN is to inspire and equip Presbyterians to care for God's earth and to increase the channels of communication between PC(USA) Environmental Ministries and congregations and presbyteries with environmental stewardship programs. Participants in EMAN are provided with regular updates from Environmental Ministries, are eligible to apply for grant funds for earth care projects in their church or presbytery, and are asked to stay in touch with other EMAN participants in their presbytery. You can sign up join EMAN at www.pcusa.org/eman.

If in the future you are looking for a more in-depth program for additional challenges, please check out our partnership with GreenFaith.org. If you become a GreenFaith church, you will still be counted as a PC (USA) Earth Care Congregation.

Please do not hesitate to contact Environmental Ministries at any time; we are here to help churches along their earth care journey. If you would ever like to share a story about earth care from your congregation, we'd love to post this on our blog or website.

Love in a Time of Fear: Muslims, Christians, and All Faiths as Good Neighbors

In late November two people sat down to tea. One was a Muslim and the other a Christian. In addition to sadness about the terrorist attacks in Paris, Lebanon, and Mali they shared their feelings about the response of political leaders and community members in the US in response to these horrific events. They decided to see if others wanted to join them in encouraging all people to remember that love of neighbor is the core teachings of Islam, Christianity, and all great faith traditions. And that to love your neighbor as yourself means to work for their well-being. 
