

THE PULSE



As I sit down to write this, I'm feeling wistful for bygone days. There was a time when composing an article for an August newsletter could mean coming up with something lighthearted, even lightweight. It's summer, after all. We're not in Advent or in Lent, but in "ordinary time," when no particular theological theme suggests itself, and no subject seems obligatory. In ordinary time, one is free to reflect on just about anything. Beyond that, summer has its own connotations. It's a time for vacations, for kicking back, and taking things easy. Once, an August article could reflect that mood. Somehow, that doesn't seem possible this year. A different mood prevails.

Newsletter deadlines being what they are, I'm writing this less than a week after the attack in Nice, on the day more police officers were shot and killed in Baton Rouge—events that echo earlier ones in Orlando and Dallas. The news has come at us fast and hard of late. It's difficult to take it all in, to process it, and to know what to say in response.

Janel Apps Ramsey, a Christian blogger, expresses a similar sentiment. After Orlando, she wrote, "While many people have said what I'm about to say - I will say it again - there just aren't words for what happened in Orlando. There just isn't a way to talk about it in a way that honors the depth and breadth of pain and sorrow that is encompassed by this tragedy. And so, I will lean into tradition, with something many

people dismiss off hand as simplistic or trite, but I call us to: Defiantly Love Your Neighbor. All the neighbors." In the face of Orlando, she said, many "defiantly chose another reality." So must we.

A month later she wrote, "This will sound so cliché. But, I'm just at a loss for words. France and another attack. Just no words left. That doesn't mean hopeless or despairing, just quiet and thoughtful. What is worth saying in the world we have lived through in the last few weeks? She offers these words:

First, repeating herself, she says, "Love your neighbor."

Second, she advises, "acknowledge your biases." Echoing the President's remarks after Dallas, she calls us to be honest about the prejudice in our own heads and in our own hearts.

Third, "Speak. Even when it's scary;" because "if we are silent then the world continues to believe that people don't matter. That very real things are just issues and not about people's lives. . . . We must speak because other people don't."

Fourth, "Create Community. Community is a powerful force. It is the force that can draw us together to change the world around us. It is how we find people that share our views and engage in conversation with those who don't. It is how we work to make things different. . . In community we find the strength to do the things that are too overwhelming to do alone."

Finally, "Build Bridges with people in other faith groups. . . Find people in other groups and get to know them. Have conversations. Share meals. Learn."

Some good words for a time when words are hard to find. I would add that we also need to look to the

words from Scripture, where we find the basis for hope in difficult times. So I end by quoting the new Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church (USA), the first African American elected to that position. Responding to events in Baton Rouge and elsewhere, Herbert J. Nelson II says the Bible reminds us, "You are from God, little children, and have overcome them, because greater is the one who is in you than the one who is in the world" (I John 4:4)." He notes that our "ability to overcome the world by the God-bestowed power within us" still requires faith and courage. But the foundation of our hope and the basis for our courage is found in God, whose character is love, whose will is peace, and whose promise is grace.

Your Neighbor.
All the neighbors."**

I'm out of words, for now. But I invite you to continue the conversation. Speak to one another, and to others, about the basis for our hope, about the need to speak up for tolerance, about the call to love others, all others. We find strength in community, a community formed by God's love.

GARY CULBERTSON JOINS INTERFAITH COALITION’S BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Interfaith Coalition is delighted to welcome Gary Culbertson as the representative from St. James Presbyterian on the Coalition’s board of directors. Gary will share his leadership skills and experience to help guide the organization. Gary shared why he is interested in serving in this way:

“My awareness of the issues of housing began when I was about ten years old. I was four when my father sold his business and enlisted in the Navy to contribute to the war effort. After the war we returned to Montana and found that there was no such thing as a vacancy rate. We lived in various substandard houses, most without indoor plumbing. I cannot claim that I suffered but it did impress on me the importance of decent housing. After I graduated from college, I started out as a teacher. My first teaching position was in a NE Montana town where many of my students lived in marginal housing with neither plumbing nor electricity. A couple of career changes over several years and I found myself as the Human Resources manager for the Housing Authority in Vancouver, Washington. This was a dream job because I could relate to and have empathy for the clients we served.

We moved to Bellingham after retirement because of my wife’s health. I was amazed and thrilled to learn about the Interfaith Coalition and the work they were doing to address homelessness. I look forward to the opportunity to contribute directly to the effort to mitigate the impact of homelessness.”

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS FOR JULY 10, 2016

Discussed:

It is the policy of St. James not to buy and use Styrofoam cups. We do use paper cups which are compostable and whenever we can, we use dishes.

Building and grounds work is addressing new landscaping on the southeast corner of the grounds, sealing the tower from rainstorms, and new signage that can be seen from the street when the parking lot is full, with sample placements up for people to see.

The sound system is of concern because it crackles and is inconsistent, operators can only adjust the volume and some people do not hear all voices and will not wear the headphones.

Bill Read is working on possible solutions.

New tables, as requested by the Women’s Association, are being purchased.

Themes for this year’s Stewardship campaign are being considered.

A new website is under construction. The current website is being maintained. Content suggestions should go to Carla Shafer, Web Editor since 2012.

Session generally supports a donation collection for Syrian Refugees, and will confirm who is receiving and distributing the gifts before approving the church as a collection site.

Interfaith Coalition will be introducing a project called Family Promise, to help families with support and resources as soon as they become homeless. This project, piloted in other communities, involves churches making space available for families four weeks a year.

Action Taken:

A recent gift of \$10,471.38 was placed in the Facilities Endowment as recommended by the Finance Committee. As an action of the Session, this places the gift in endowment investments, but does not necessarily confine the use of the earnings related to this gift to facility expenses.
