Pulse - December 2017 - "Waking Up in Advent"

"And mama in her kerchief and I in my cap, had just settled our brains for a long winter's nap. When out on the lawn there arose such a clatter, I sprang from my bed to see what was the matter..."

A long winter's nap sounds lovely these days. The days are dark and the nights are long, the wind howls and the rain pours down. To sit by a warm fire or tuck in for a good long nap, lulling to sleep during these cold waning days of the year sounds very enticing.

Sometimes we feel like we're asleep even as we walk around in the world. I find myself asleep and ushered into complacency by cheery jingles and bright red coffee cups, worn out by the noise of the holidays and lulled toward hibernation by the sheer volume of the "Christmas Season." It is so easy for me to run headlong into the spirit of the holidays and to totally miss the point.

Advent is for waking up. While the world in darkness dreams during the month of December, it is in these days leading up to Christmas that the church tells a radically different story. We proclaim that the darkness does not have the final word — the light will return and will break out in our lives anew as we celebrate the coming of Emmanuel, God with us.

So while we might be drawn toward the numbing glow of Christmas lights or distracted by the nostalgic stories of reindeer and elves, the church's proclamation at this time of year is that this is a season to be ready, to come awake, to anticipate the birth of Christ and the coming of the king. Our Sunday readings are apocalyptic and prophetic — unveiling and pointing to the truth of the Christchild's loving reign!

I'm sure you remember the anticipation of Christmas morning from when you were a child. My sister and I used to sneak up the stairs to our living room, hoping to catch a glimpse of presents around the tree and all the possibility that exciting

day would hold. We could hardly contain our wakefulness. But over the years, the wakefulness wears off. The burdens of the broken world and the darkness of the season weigh us down. And yet we are inspired not to lose heart as we hear the story of Advent again — the light is coming! Wake up!

In this season of Advent, I hope you hear the call to wakefulness. Wakefulness in your soul, where you are opened up to the work God is already doing in you. This is a season of hope, faith, joy, and love — markers of the good news in our lives and reminders of God's continual presence with us, calling us to wake from our sleep. Like children anticipating the dawn of Christmas Day, so we also are called to wake up to the coming of the light of Christ, the dawning of Emmanuel.

Children's Ministries

Godly Play presents the following stories:

Dec. 3: Children begin the journey toward the mystery of Christmas and the town of Bethlehem by lighting the first candle. The lesson sparks their anticipation, building up toward lighting the Christ candle.

Dec.10: In Advent II, Godly Play focuses on the Holy Family and learning about the prophets. They also are introduced

to traditional liturgical language more directly than in previous lessons.

Dec. 17: This Sunday combines Advent III and IV. Children explore the roles of the shepherds and of the wise men. A review of advent invites anticipation of the Christ child.

Dec. 24: Advent culminates in the incarnation. Classical artist renderings tell the story: The Annunciation; Visitation; Nativity; Adoration of the Magi; Presentation in the Temple; Massacre of the Innocents; and the Flight into Egypt. Nonreaders can label and order the pictures; older children can read the text of Madeleine L'Engle's The Glorious Impossible.

Please be sure to check in your children downstairs for Godly Play and/or the Preschool/Nursery room. We ask that you turn in a registration form each school year for your child. Ask one of the teachers for one if you did not receive one, and turn it in to a teacher or the Christian Education mailbox in the hallway near the church office.

From the Treasurer's report, the amount received for 2017 pledges was less than projected, but offerings were more than anticipated. The overall financial status is good and on track for 2017 end of year closeout.

From Building and Grounds, approval was received for the expenditure of \$84,000 (not to exceed) for the bath-room renovation project. The project is scheduled to begin in early January and is expected to be completed in two months.

From Mission and Social Action, the Interfaith "Family Promise" program is set to commence March 2018 with St. James serving as a support church.

A Surprise Found in Storage!

The Christmas Joy Offering celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ, the truly "indescribable gift," as well as the gifts of church leaders—past, present, and future.

In the second letter to the Corinthians, Paul talks of a generous gift that has been promised. As he sends folks ahead to make arrangements for this gift, he takes the opportunity to illuminate the impact of generosity. Paul grounds readers first in God's generosity, reminding us that God not only provides seed for sowing and bread for food, but God goes further, partnering in human generosity both as source and as amplification. The gifts we give are from God, and they are multiplied and increased by God as we give. The result of the generous gift made by the Corinthians therefore has a compounding effect, enriching the Corinthians "in every way." It results in impact to those whose need is met, and the ministry made possible by the gift—to the giver of the gift as well. It then overflows in thanksgiving to God and benefits the whole church as it inspires and testifies to the gracious work of God through Christ. It is that grace, then, that Paul describes as "indescribable."

Through the work of the Christmas Joy Offering, we seek the living of this truth: that God's generosity is the source, the support, and the outcome of our own. We give because God has freely given. We give to support the needs of our church leaders—past, present, and future—and God amplifies and extends those gifts through the ministry of those leaders. Their gifts of ministry extend and amplify as well, "overflowing" in thanksgiving to God, and the entire environment of generosity bears witness to God's grace, a truly indescribable gift.

Thanks be to God for this indescribable gift.

-2 Corinthians 9:15


