February is the month our nation sets aside to honor and celebrate the achievements of African American men and women throughout history – people whose contributions were long overlooked. Of those we honor, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. is surely among the best known and most admired. With a conviction informed by his Christian faith, Dr. King led the non-violent fight for civil rights, promoted peace, and advocated economic justice.

Dr. King delivered many addresses, including his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. While aimed at the critical issues of his day, his words are timeless, and speak with equal relevance now. As a pastor, Dr. King also delivered many sermons. I recently came across a Christmas sermon on peace. These words, excerpted from that sermon delivered in 1967, seem equally well addressed to the issues of our time:

"Now let me suggest first that if we are to have peace on earth, our loyalties must become ecumenical rather than sectional. Our loyalties must transcend our race, our tribe, our class, and our nation; and this means we must develop a world perspective. No individual can live alone; no nation can live alone, and as long as we try, the more we are going to have war in this world. Now the judgment of God is upon us, and we must either learn to live together as brothers or we are all going to perish together as fools." (Today, I suspect Dr. King would say "brothers and sisters.")



He went on to remind us of our interdependence, as nations and as individuals, and of our responsibility to care for others, here and around the world. "It really boils down to this: that all life is interrelated. We are all caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied into a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly. We are made to live together because of the interrelated structure of reality."

Dr. King had a dream of unity and hope, of justice and peace. Today some are endorsing a different vision, one that promotes separateness, that advocates looking out for number one, that divides us rather than unites us. Dr. King's words about the inescapable network of mutuality" and our "single garment of destiny" (which echo his letter from Birmingham) are a welcome antidote to so much of what we hear in this current political season.

I invite you to use this month to recall and reflect on the wisdom of Dr. King; to remember a vision informed by Christian faith and undergirded by a conviction of the value and dignity of every person. As Christians, our dreams and our visions must always be informed by our faith.

Feb. 5: Letting the Light Through. The focus scripture is Matthew 5:13-20. Children explore the notion of God's love shining within us. Our behavior towards others shows God's love.

St. James ended 2016 with a surplus of \$17,671. This is the fifth year in a row that we have ended the year with a surplus amount. Each year the surplus has been placed into a reserve account where the Finance Committee and Session has agreed it should go. An example is the Pastoral Transition Reserve that was created at the end of 2013.

We pay the per capita that St. James owes the Presbytery over the next three months. Therefore, we would encourage everyone to pay St. James what they owe if you haven't already done so. The cost is \$50.00 per member. We want to thank everyone who has already paid their share.
