#### July 2015 Pastor's Pulse Article

At the April meeting of Session, our church leadership voted to form a Task Force to explore our ongoing ministry to children, youth, young adults, and families at Saint James. A number of individuals have already expressed a willingness to serve on this Task Force. They are: Laurie Anderson, Tracy Caruso, Faye Hill, and Gretchen Pfueller. If you are interested in these issues and have something to contribute, or if you would like to volunteer to serve on the Task Force, please let me know.

Here are the parameters of the Task Force's job description.

1) Explore the area demographics of Bellingham and of our Fairhaven community. Make a recommendation about whether or not these demographics support the success of a vibrant ministry to children, youth, young adults, and families at Saint James.

2) Do we have the volunteer support in our congregation necessary for this ministry to flourish? Make a recommendation about whether Saint James is equipped and called by God to pursue a vibrant ministry to children, youth, young adults, and families. Explain what factors have influenced your decision.

3) If you believe that God is calling our church to strengthen this ministry, explore possible funding sources for revitalization. How much money is needed to resurrect these ministries? (Pastor Jon also has some information from a consulting firm that I am happy to share with the Task Force and Session).

4) How would we go about finding a paid staff person to fill this role? Would the search be local, regional, national? How many hours/week would the paid staffer(s) need to work in order to effectively fulfill the responsibilities? What would the pay rate need to be in order for the position to be attractive to a strong candidate? Would the paid staffer(s) focus only on certain aspects of this ministry or on all ages included in the children, youth, young adult, and family categories?

5) The Task Force will complete their work within six months and provide a final report to Session upon completion of the task. Interim reports will be made available to Session throughout the process, as appropriate.

### PCUSA Middle East Summary Report



In the ancient land where Abraham came from, the Presbyterian churches continue their witness for Christ, together with ancient churches dating from the apostolic era (in the first few centuries after Christ). These ancient churches (including Chaldean, Assyrian, Armenian), spread Christianity to India and other parts of Asia. American Presbyterians have been engaged with these churches, and later with local Presbyterians, since the mid-1840s. Outreach and support by the Presbyterian Church (USA) continues today, promoted by the Iraq Partnership Network (IPN). Some of the information from the latest IPN newsletter is included hereunder.

Following the invasion of Iraq in 2003, several hundred thousand Iraqi Christians fled the country, mostly to Syria, where they were given hospitality by the non-Islamic, secular government and the local Christian communities. More recently, thousands, including large numbers of Christians driven out by ISIS, fled from Mosul and nearby villages to the relative safety of the Kurdish-controlled areas further East. The Christian communities there (as well as in other parts of the country) are actively involved in providing help to the refugees.

At the moment there are Evangelical (Presbyterian) churches in five major cities across Iraq.\*) Members of one of these churches support a radio ministry. In another town, the congregation has organized a rapidly expanding preschool program.

A team of the Iraq Partnership Program recently visited Iraq. They describe the work Presbyterian co-workers are doing and the need for outside help. This includes advocacy to urge the U.S. and other governments to fulfill their pledges for humanitarian relief in Iraq (and Syria). A major concern expressed to the IPN team was assistance with medical care. Prayers are asked, amongst others for the displaced people who are without homes, jobs, income; also for the new church starting in Erbil (Northern Iraq), the summer training program, and education opportunities for the displaced children.

## Session Highlights

Discussed:

- Continued Action Planning.
- In considering the mission statement: "We joyfully welcome youth and young families into our intergenerational and loving community of faith, nurturing relationships that bridge our differences," we discussed the current situation with the isolated elderly members and brainstormed possible activities and long range outcomes. Next meeting we plan to consider how the church serves retired and active members and members who work between the approximate ages of 50 to 65.

Reported:

- The Congregational life committee is planning barbecues this summer (salmon in July and pulled pork in August). Everyone is welcome.
- The next St. James "Connect Event" will be in the fall.
- Heidi's preschool class is moving to Larrabee school. Daravon's class for younger preschooler's will continue downstairs. New opportunities for space use and church program development can now be considered.
- A letter writing campaign to Congress people on world hunger will take place in June. The Undie Sunday campaign to collet new underwear for homeless people will occur in July.
- Staff reviews were completed and there were no major issues. We commend our staff for their excellent work.

Decided:

- To develop a group of visitors (in addition to Deacons) to expand our outreach to isolated and elderly members.
- Not to host a ReSources Community meeting on the current situation with coal and oil train shipments.

## Per Capita: What do You Get for Your Money?

Per capita pays for the operating overhead of the church at all levels beyond the congregation. It works like an insurance policy: the churches together provide services for congregations. Presbytery, funded by per capita, engages, equips and encourages people and congregations.

The Westminster Confession says, "all believers, are therefore, under obligation to sustain the ordinances of the Christian religion where they are already established, and to contribute by their prayers, gifts, and personal efforts to the extension of the Kingdom of God throughout the whole earth" (6.058).

**Reformed theology and polity** including Constitution (*Book of Confessions & Book of Order*) and all support for a democratic, constitutional system of Christian governance. Processes for discernment, decision-making, and action responding to God's mission.

**Network of people, expertise, and resources.** All for one and one for all!

**Presbytery Staff:** Executive Presbyter, Stated Clerk, Communications Coordinator and Bookkeeper. Per Capita pays a portion of staff salaries at Synod and GA.

**Mission--**100% of your NPSP mission contributions go to recipient. Operations is paid by per capita.

## **Homeless Connect**

The 7th annual Bellingham/Whatcom Project Homeless Connect (B/WPHC) event will take place on Friday July 24h 2015 at Bellingham High School on Cornwall Ave. The primary goal is to express goodwill toward offering service and generous hospitality for neighbors who are unsheltered or experiencing a housing crisis. This one-day, one-stop event mobilizes community volunteers, service providers, and the donor community in order to:

- $\hfill\square$  Invite and welcome people who are homeless
- $\hfill\square$  Reduce barriers to service
- Provide immediate service outcomes
- □ Create sustainable and long term service partnerships
- □ Track and publicize results that connect to the 10-Year County-wide Plan to eliminate homelessness.

Originating in 2004, PHC is a now used in well over 700 communities across the US as well as in Canada and Australia to focus local resources on ending homelessness.

#### **Key Characteristics**

PHC is a model for civic engagement recognized by the US Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) as a best practice. While PHC events reflect local needs and priorities, they share several key features:

- □ Hospitality People Experiencing Homelessness as Welcomed Guests
- □ Immediacy Responsive Same-Day Service
- □ Community Voluntary Civic Participation
- □ Partnership Across Agencies and Sectors
- □ Excellence Rigorous Evaluation and Improvement.

St. James has had a vendor's table to show support of the LBGTQ community and develop connections and awareness. This year's event is Sunday, July 12, 2015. ## Big benefits in small churches

Of the 10,053 PC(USA) congregations, more than 50 percent (5,675) have fewer than 100 members. Among those congregations, the average membership is 45. Fewer than 2 percent of PC(USA) churches have more than 1,000 members. This mirrors the National Congregation Study that found that 59 percent of all churches have fewer than 100 members and that only 2.5 percent have more than 1,000 members.

There are positives in being a small church. For example, because everyone in the congregation often knows everyone else, close relationships tend to develop. Members still bring food when a birth or death occurs. Every member has a greater opportunity to be heard, and the pastor has more opportunities to give members individual attention. That sense of belonging inspires action: a greater proportion of members of small churches participate in the work of the church.

While small churches may not offer all the programs that larger churches do, they share the same purpose—to share the faith, make disciples, and build interconnected communities. *Presbyterians Today*

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
