Pentecost Is New Creation by The Rev. Jon Hauerwas

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 117-119)

According to the Day of Pentecost story in Acts 2:1-13, God gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower witnesses to the resurrection. Sounds from heaven, cosmic language, the rush of a mighty *ruach* (wind, spirit, breath) invaded the house in which the apostles gathered, and appeared to them as a burning fire. Tongues of fire touched their nerve centers. A power — the unseen power of God — moved among them and gripped them. The Holy Spirit is unseen, like the wind, which is why the Old Testament calls it *ruach YHWH*, "the wind, or breath, of God" (cf. John 3:8). The Spirit is the "unseenness of God" working among us.

According to Joel (2:28-29) the *ruach* is to open everybody to God's future. People young and old will dream and will have visions of hope; they will be able to loose themselves from the way things are now, because God is establishing a whole new economy of creation. The Holy Spirit breaks us out of our preoccupation with ourselves and frees us to serve neighbors, loosens our grasp on possessions, and sets us to loving people. New creation is what Joel is talking about. Pentecost is new creation.

The book of Acts tells the story of the outcome of Pentecost's new creation: people witness in word and in deed to the risen Christ. At the outset, the newborn church immediately tumbled out into the streets to witness to God's mighty works in the languages of people all over the world. By the end of the story, a tiny, Spirit-filled community of faith that broke from its present order has spread across the continents with incredible power to bring new things into being. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible.

Therefore, on the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate God's gift of Holy Spirit which draws us

together as one people, helps us to comprehend what God is doing in the world, and empowers us to proclaim, in word and in deed, God's plan of reconciling all people in the name of Christ (Ephesians 1:10).

Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ's church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. A spirit-filled community of faith opens eyes to needs in the world and sees its mission as God's new people. The Day of Pentecost is the climax of the Great Fifty Days of Easter, celebrating as it does the gift of the Spirit to the body of Christ — the church.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS 2015

Discussed:

The first line of the Mission statement, which says, "Saint James Presbyterian Church is a beacon on the hill where people respond to opportunities God sets before us." was considered. The statement suggests that our church is a place where people look up to the church as a place showing direction (like a lighthouse does for boats). It suggests that God is always setting new opportunities before us to do worthwhile acts. Past and current opportunities were reviewed and some new possibilities were lifted up for the 2015-2020 Action Plan.

Reported:

- Electricity use is higher than previous years. People need to turn them off when they leave the rooms.
- Building and Grounds priority is making the building handicapped accessible. They recommended that the Session consider not installing solar panels at this time. It was suggested that we encourage members to get solar panels on their homes. It was suggested that we work with Habitat for Humanity and Interfaith Coalition to install solar panels on new low-income families' houses. A hard copy of the Solar Panel Task Force Report is being made available in the church library.
- Building insurance has been taken out with Charity First.
- Membership classes are scheduled.
- Progressive Christian Voices is conducting a book drive at WWU for students around the world.
- A no tolerance policy on sexual abuse or harassment has been written for the Personnel Policies and will be recommended next month.
- Pentecost will be celebrated on May 24, 2015 with people speaking a passage from the Book of Acts in different languages simultaneously.

Decided:

We will hold a congregational meeting on April 19, 2015 to nominate Gary Culbertson a ruling elder in the vacant position.

We will have a Celebration of the Earth Concert on May 1, 2014 at 7:30pm featuring music by Dana Lyons.

New LIFE

In the spirit of Lent and Easter we recently said "farewell" to something in order to welcome new life on our church grounds. Two trees, in particular, became problematic. The first was the large pin oak which has been greeting participants at the front door for decades. The root system on this tree was tearing up the sidewalk and, if left checked, would soon break a part our reader board. During the fall, it drops debris onto the shingles and into the gutters while its branches shade the roof. Each of these factors encourages the growth of moss and mold which cause rot and shorten the life span of our investment there. In the back of the church, a plum tree was also removed. It was diseased in the trunk at the same time that it was growing into the power lines. Now that this project is completed, we will plant at least one new tree on church property.


