"Pastor's Note"

A Season of Shift

Friends of Saint James Presbyterian Church, welcome to September! The last days of Summer are upon us and Autumn is slowly creeping in. School is beginning and the seasons are shifting.

Looking forward into Autumn, I am encouraged to begin a season of shifting, growing, and renewing our commitment to one another as a church. In the month of September, we have the opportunity to do many things together that mark our common bonds as a community. First, we are launching a new Sunday morning children's program, Godly Play. Godly Play embraces a style of curious, experiential learning for children to encounter the story of God in fresh, life-

connected ways. Godly Play connects our children to the story of the church's liturgical year cycle, moving them through the seasons of God's work in their lives as they see the story of God unfolding each week in worship. My hope is that we will see Godly Play as a shift for our entire community, a place for us to embrace loving care of our children in new ways and be inspired in our worship in "big church" as well.

In September, we will also welcome new members into our worshipping community. Membership courses at the end of August and beginning of September will culminate in the welcoming of new and transferring members to Saint James on September 17. On this joyous occasion, we bear witness to the deepening of connection for these people who have journeyed along with us and now seek to publicly declare their faith in Jesus and their participation as members of

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Christ's body in this church. If you are interested in joining or learning more about this process, let me know! It's not too late!

I have long believed that the shift from Summer to Fall is time of rich reflection and renewal. I embrace a practice I like to call "Autumnal Resolutions." Connected with the natural life cycle of plants preparing for the long winter, we also can embrace a cycle of shedding off what hinders us, break old habits, and prepare ourselves for the season of the coming of Christ's light, which we celebrate in the darkness of Winter. Over the last few years as a church, Saint James has been in the process of exploring what it means to shift and grow into our identity as a community that shares the love and grace of Christ throughout our neighborhood. Over the course of the Autumn, we will make resolutions together through our Stewardship Campaign, how we will pledge the resources God has given us to bless one another and the missions of our church.

We will also spend time reflecting on who we are as a church with our mission and vision. The Saint James Session met recently to deepen their bonds of relationship with one another and explore hopes for how God is perhaps leading us in the years to come. This Autumn will be a time deepening those conversations and beginning to set in motion plans for how we enter more fully into a chapter of renewal and growth as a community.

What is shifting in you this month? How is God calling you to change like the leaves, to embrace this cycle of renewal as one season draws to a close? I'd love to hear about it. Please stop by and say hello or send me an email or give me a phone call — I want to hear your stories of how God is leading you in this season of our life together.

World Communion Sunday - October 1



October 1 is World Communion Sunday, a yearly celebration of the Lord's Supper together with the church worldwide. As we gather for worship, we gather to practice the act of remembering Christ's last meal with his disciples in connection with our brothers and sisters in the faith around the world.

For that Sunday, we are asking the congregation to share any chalices they may have in their personal collections so that we can display them around the sanctuary. We do this to symbolically represent the Last Supper. If you have chalices to share, please mark them with your name and bring them to church on September 24 (the Sunday before). They can be taken home following worship on October 1. Thank you!

OFFERINGS: OPPORTUNITIES FOR PARTNERSHIP, LEARNING, AND WITNESS

The four church wide Special Offerings of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) are a collective witness to Jesus Christ's love for the whole church. One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost Offering, Peace & Global Witness Offering, and Christmas Joy Offering play an important role in defining what it means to be a connectional church. Over the years these offerings have provided ways for individuals and congregations to join together with each other and in partnership with other Christians in responding to a variety of concerns.

It is a tradition at Saint James to participate in the Presbyterian Church's Peace and Global Witness Offering which ends on World Communion Sunday. This special offering will be will be used to enable the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world, as well as in our own local community.

At Saint James, we will receive the Peace and Global Witness Offering on Sunday, September 17th. 25% of the total offering will be divided among Whatcom Peace and Justice Center, Tierra Nueva, for their jail ministry, Engedi Refuge, for victims of human trafficking in Lynden, and Community to Community for assisting farm workers.

Farmworkers Ministry North West

On Sunday, August 6, Honesto Silva Ibarra died at Harborview Medical Center after he fell ill while working in very hot weather at a berry farm in Sumas, WA. During the week that he died, I attended two meetings where the situation at the blueberry labor camp (Sarabanand Farms) was described by observers and workers. It sounded horrific and the employer did not seem to be living up to their federal contract. By not renewing temporary worker VISAs the employer is trapping workers in the U.S. and making them criminals, as they are now undocumented. The workers' houses are surrounded by a chain link fence and they are locked in each night, only let out to work the next morning. They pay just over \$80 each week for meager rations. The farmworker union: Familias Undas por la Justicas, (FUJ), is helping workers find resources and has successfully signed a farmworkers contract this spring. You can get information at this KUOW website http://kuow.org/post/death-ignites-labortensions-berry-farm-near-canada and you can ask me about local meetings.

In May, 2017 I became a board member of the Farmworkers Ministry-NW, which is a cluster group of the National Farmworkers Ministry NFM was organized in 1920 and Presbyterians have been part of it ever since.

For two years, I have been meeting with local church people to provide local support and gather information. There are five of us. If you are interested, I'd be happy to provide more information.

I've written a poem which helps me deal with my own pain and frustration at what I perceive as this needless death and the continued mistreatment of people providing food for our tables. I was a school kid farmworker and it wasn't fun, but it only lasted 6 summers, my parents provided room, board, gas money, and I earned the tuition for my first year at college in 1962.

Lady Liberty: Her Brother's Keeper by Carla Shafer

All day in the yard—I staked tomatoes prone to sprawl. Replanted lettuce, picked zucchini, watered cucumbers, beans, eggplants, and peppers. I learned today that Honesto Silvas Ibarra, an H2a worker, twenty-eight year-old father of three died yesterday, collapsed two days earlier in a blueberry field thirty miles from my backyard garden.

His employer said he had to work.
His employer let his VISA expire. so
though he tried, he couldn't get a ticket home.
It's the law you know for the employer
to renew it. Maybe you didn't know.
We should all know. We should love these
people who risk life for field work
in America. Imagine being so poor.

We should protect them. If we don't then who are we?

Together for Peace: Respect, Safety and Dignity for All Submitted by Gretchen Pfueller

Hundreds in Bellingham gather every year on International Day of Peace -- September 21 -- in solidarity with people around the world. In 1982, the United Nations declared this day an annual worldwide 24-hour cease-fire to envision what our world can look like without weapons, violence, and oppression.

"Together for Peace: Respect, Safety, and Dignity for All" is the theme of this year's International Day of Peace. In Bellingham, we will hold our 14th annual event at the Majestic, from 6:00-8:30 p.m. on Thursday, September 21.

We are proud to announce this year's keynote speaker: Harsha Walia.

Harsha Walia is an author and activist trained in the law. She is the a cofounder of the migrant justice group No One Is Illegal, author of award-winning book "Undoing Border Imperialism," (available for purchase at WPJC) and Project Coordinator at the Downtown Eastside Women's Center.

For the past two decades she has been involved in anti-racist, feminist, Indigenous solidarity, and anti-capitalist grassroots community organizing. Harsha has made numerous presentations on race, gender and poverty to the United Nations and across campuses and media outlets in North America and Europe.

Harsha is a recipient of the Canadian Center for Policy Alternatives Power of Youth Award, Westender's Best of the City in Activism Award, and been named "one of Canada's most brilliant and effective organizers" by Naomi Klein.

In addition to Harsha's keynote speech, the evening will include the presentation of the 2017 Howard Harris Lifetime Peacemaker Award, which is awarded annually to a local peacemaker whose life's work is in the spirit of Howard Harris, one of the founders of Bellingham's peace vigil.

The program will also feature music by Meghan Yates (of Meghan Yates & the Reverie Machine), reflections on the past and coming year from the Whatcom Peace & Justice Center, and time to remember those we've lost this year.

A community dinner is one new addition for this year's celebration! We are serving up a buffet from 6:00-7:00 p.m. Sliding scale for a plate runs \$5 - \$20, including dessert. Proceeds benefit the Whatcom Peace & Justice Center. Come and break bread with your community!
