A GOOD WILDERNESS

"God never wastes a wilderness."

In early December, one of St. James Elders sent this short quote to the church Session. They sent it to encourage us as we went into the final weeks of 2020, a profoundly challenging year. I believe they sent it with the intention to remind us all that God is up to something in this wilderness of a year. God is doing something in us, moving through the downed trees and tangled undergrowth that has been this year. Our work is to pay attention and remember that God is not wasting any moment but rather stirring up the next thing.

We closed out the 2020 year with Zoom services, gathered distantly in our homes, yet bound together all the more through this challenging time. And



as we look ahead into 2021, we are gifted with the chance to ask: "God, what are you up to?" We have certainly been in a wilderness of masks, hand sanitizer, nasal swabs, new technology, and profound heartache. Where is God in this wilderness?

Before noting some places that I believe God is stirring us up as we walk through the wilderness, I want to pause to remind us: God is with us in the wilderness. In the trees, it can be difficult to see how God could possibly be moving through all that is not right in this present day. But that is precisely where God is: HERE! God has been journeying alongside us (and ahead, above, below, and behind us) through this wilderness. Like any experienced guide, God knows where they are going. Siblings in Christ, please never forget this: God will never leave us or forsake us in the wilderness. The wildernesses of our life will come and go, but God remains faithful and present.

So what might God be doing in this wilderness? I see lots of ways God has used 2020 to strengthen and focus the ways the Church works in the world. First, we have seen how the Church "came home" and was discovered at our hearths, tables, computer, and tablet screens. We are no longer able to separate "home life" and "church life" — these spaces have bled together and reminded us that the sacred can be discovered anywhere, in any home and in any wilderness. Second, we have seen the emergence of renewed connections with each other in simple, intimate ways. I have heard from several folks who began to get involved with the St. James congregation just as the pandemic hit. While that might seem like a wilderness too vast to actually keep engaging in, these folks have even found new and deep connections through our post-church Zoom fellowship, book studies online, posting pictures of "COVID life" and, sharing in the journey together. Where the wilderness may have separated us from these new members, God has used it as a journey to bind us closer together. We have found ways to walk the path through the wilderness together, helping others along, and caring for one another. This has been beautiful.

Finally, I see that God has used this time of wilderness to remind us who we are. In the Scriptures, the wilderness is often a place where prophets and disciples seek the Spirit and discover their calling. For so many of us, the wilderness of 2020 has been a space for clarifying where we see God leading us. Personally, I feel the call out of this wilderness to focus on speaking up for issues of justice to raise my voice as an ally to the oppressed. And I'm feeling called to do this in new ways that I don't think would have emerged if I had not been invited to walk through this wilderness over the last year. The wilderness still seems vast. We can't see beyond, right now at least. But we can affirm that God is not wasting this good wilderness to help us grow, bear witness to God's lovingkindness day by day, and build our resolve to live in faith, hope, and love as we journey into 2021.

We made it to the end of 2020! Every December the Finance Committee prepares a proposed General Operating Budget based on forecasted giving and projected expenses. It is safe to say that, though we always anticipate that things will not shake down exactly as expected, none of us were prepared for the roller coaster this past year would bring. Even so, we predict that will end the year with our general operating fund, the endowment funds, and our designated giving funds to remain strong.

Through God's faithfulness and St. James' history of wise stewardship, we are hopeful for what we will be able to do in 2021!

Pledges and offerings help move the day-to-day ministry of St. James forward. It was exciting to see an increase in our general offering over the past twelve months, though overall, both income and expenses have been lower than projected. We currently have approximately \$6,500 in excess as of November 30.

Godly Play Schedule January

January 3rd: Epiphany

In this lesson, we remember the arrival of the Magi in Bethlehem. We will recall together all the weeks in Advent as we had before Christmas but give special attention to the final purple candle, the one that represents the three kings. We will stop here and pay attention to what the three gifts were and what they symbolize as gifts for a baby who is the Messiah.

January 10th: Holy Baptism

In this lesson, we learn that Baptism is full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into the Church. For Christians, this rite is the gateway into the family of families we call the Church. We ask the children to remember or look forward to the day of their baptism by lighting candles from the light of the Christ Candle since this is also the day they receive their "light."

January 17th: Parable of the Good Shepherd

In this lesson we hear the parable of the Good Shepherd, in which the shepherd searches for his one lost sheep, leaving the other ninety-nine to do so. This parable is often considered more of an identity statement than a parable.

January 24thth: Parable of the Good Samaritan

The Parable of the Good Samaritan. Jerome Berryman says that "it is important for children to encounter parables during childhood so they can develop the ability to hear with their own ears what Jesus was communicating when he spoke in parables." Our parable boxes use 2-dimensional materials to help reiterate that these are Jesus's words and stories to us. The wondering questions used for parable lessons are designed to encourage children to see that there are deeper meanings in the parables than what they might initially encounter.

RETURNING TO 'NORMAL'

A vaccine is on the way! After months of worry, this news gives us hope. But what does this news mean for St. James? When can we get back to normal?

The practical reality is that it's going to be some months before a significant portion of our population has been vaccinated—possibly into the summer. And the scientific reality is that engaging in indoor activities remains among the riskiest of behaviors when it comes to this virus.

While the State of Washington allows us to resume certain church and building activities, it doesn't mean we should, especially given our demographics and this

winter's surge in cases. In addition to not wanting to lose a single person at St. James to COVID-19, we also do not want to add to the burden on medical providers and our local hospital.

Masks, reducing the number of people in a room and social distancing do help reduce the risk of exposure from the virus, but these mitigation measures do not eliminate risk. Until the vaccine is widely in use, no guideline or procedure we can implement at St. James is 100% foolproof in eliminating your risk of exposure while in the church building at St. James.

So what does that mean for getting back to "normal"? It means that, given the winter surge, we go slowly. And it means that we give grace to Session members, staff, and committee chairs, who have been charged with implementing our reopening guidelines and making decisions regarding when to continue certain church and building activities. The decisions they make can mean the difference between life and death. Though we desperately want to get back to some semblance of normal, we want to make sure we are doing everything we can to protect the people of St. James—even if that means waiting for a little.


