

December 2021 — In Between



Advent is a time between times. It is a space in our year to consider what is shifting, adapting, and growing as we await the arrival of the Christ-child. To live in between, we must have practices that encourage our patience, sustain our minds and bodies, and keep pointing us in the right direction to come home to Christ.

One of the final books I'm reading this term for my doctoral program is Deep Survival by Laurence Gonzales. The book's premise is: "who lives, who dies, and why." The author examines the training and survival methods of Army Rangers, wilderness guides, experienced rock climbers, and river rafters to discern what it takes to survive in shifting, uncertain, dangerous circumstances. Our bodies must adapt, our mental models change, and we must be in tune with our emotions to pass through the in-between times of survival and struggle. The ones who can live and thrive in the face of such danger are the ones who can follow the leading of their hearts, which call us beyond the status quo or the plan to see what is often unseen.

As we live in this season of Advent, I wonder if we can explore a bit of our adaptability. As we wait for the light of Christ to dawn, how do we tend our hearts, strengthen our devotions in prayer and worship, shift and grow to the new circumstances and needs for care that arise amidst our ever-changing world? The story of the people of God is one where we learn, again and again, to lean not on our own understanding but to seek first God's kingdom before all things. We wait in the hope of Christ's coming, knowing that God will invite us to be changed and renewed through Christ's arrival.

As we move through the weeks of Advent, with the days growing shorter and shorter, it seems an opportunity to evaluate the steps we take along the journey. In this in-between time, we consider: where is our hope, what leads us to joy, what sustains God's peace in us, and how might we more fully love our neighbors in new and impactful ways? To embrace the in-between is to learn how to survive in a shifting world, to hold fast in faith in Christ alone, nothing else.

I wonder what this journey looks like for you this year. In some ways, the steps toward the light of Christmas are familiar. We walk along a road that many have trod before us, a well-worn path of faithful pilgrims through the generations. In other ways, because of our world context and social pressures, we may feel we have set out into uncharted territory. Whatever way you face this Advent journey, trust that God has provided you with what you need. While we are "in-between," God meets us right where we are to sustain and support our steps. Perhaps you find this in how an Advent devotional stirs your heart and mind. Maybe you find this support from God in the practice of lighting Advent candles. Or perhaps you find you survive the in-between by practicing times of deep silence amidst all the hurry and noise of the season. Whatever the steps of the journey look like, know that God is with us. This is the promise of Emmanuel, God...with...us.

May you experience the blessed in between of this season as we wait in hope for Christ, who is Child and Savior, Sustainer and Friend.

During November and December the Finance Committee, the Session, and our amazing St. James Treasurer are working hard to complete the 2022 General Operating Budget. It is not too late to turn in your 2022 Stewardship Pledge. As of November 20, we have received \$164,928 in pledges and anticipate more to come based on past years' records. After the past two years, we know - more than ever - how unpredictable life can be. As we plan for 2022, we are grateful for a positive response to the pledge drive, a healthy amount of money built up in our reserves, and robust endowment funds. 

GardenView Tiny Home Community

Pastor Seth Thomas, Maureen Kosa, and Ray Dellecker visited the new GardenView tiny home community on Lakeway on November 8. Our host was Echohawk, a Pawnee, who has lived in Alaska, is passionate about housing issues, was trained by Low-Income Housing Institute (LIHI) in Seattle, and then asked for an assignment in Bellingham. The Pawnee mantra: "Work for the people, don't talk about it"

GardenView is a partnership of Road2Home and LIHI, under agreement with the City of Bellingham. The village consists of 30 tiny homes, 14 of which are currently occupied, 6 ready for occupancy, and 10 still under construction. Each home is 8' x 12' with electricity for lighting and heat.

There are community facilities for cooking, dining, bathrooms and showers, laundry, crafts room, and computer room. Echohawk herself is on site 8 hours a day, and two other staff members cover the other shifts. Among her many management tasks, Echohawk maintains a list of chores for the residents to perform: kitchen cleanup, bathroom cleanup, grounds maintenance.

Road2Home provides case management services, and each resident is expected to see their case manager at least twice a month.

Echohawk expressed appreciation for recent visits to GardenView by Mayor Fleetwood and Governor Inslee.

Residents are seniors or veterans, many of whom were recently homeless and living in camps or cars. In many cases, these folks were located by the Opportunity Council and recommended for this village. Prospective residents have to agree to abide by a set of rules, including no alcohol or drugs in the public spaces, and to work toward sobriety. Echohawk said her philosophy is to "meet folks where they're at." Their goal is that residents would move on to more permanent housing within 9 months.

They are in need of construction volunteers to help finish the remaining homes. Also, Echohawk provided us with a list of items that the village needs, including plastic storage tubs, Christmas stocking stuffers, and other items. Our Mission committee is spearheading a project to deliver enough stockings for every Gardenview resident prior to Christmas. We thank you for your generous support!
