



Greetings,

Today is June 8, 2022. I typically try to write my Pulse article for the church newsletter by the 28th of the month, giving us a couple of days to put the whole thing together, edit, and get out the door. Most months, I have something of substance to say, encourage, and help frame what we are doing together as a congregation. I enjoy it.

And yet, I sit here today acknowledging that I have not had words to share yet. I'm honestly at a loss of what to say about our nation and children and parents have found themselves crying out about these past few weeks: *Gun violence*.

As long as I've served in church ministry, I've wondered about our role as ministers and leaders to speak up about the most challenging aspects of our public life together. Even with years of formal training, experience, and mentoring, I have never been formally directed or given permission to speak up about things like war, sexual assault, gun violence, racism, homophobia, etc. (it's a long list). There seems to be an unwritten expectation that pastors don't "rock the boat" and instead offer comfort through the afflictions, assurance of grace in the face of sin, and hope for things that are yet to come.

But where is the church's witness when our children are staring down the barrel of an automatic weapon?

You see, it's become clear to me that the problem isn't about whether or not we should say anything about horrific violent acts that destroy human lives. Of course, we should! Of course, as people of God who value the sacredness of human lives, we should speak up and stand up for the innocents who are at risk. Of course, we should.

But often, we don't. And that is what bothers me most deeply. When we face a world fraught with wicked problems, it is more common for our communities to look on and struggle to do or say anything. I am coming to believe that my silence wholly undermines the church's witness to the good news of Jesus.

Jesus' message of good news of great joy to all people changes our hearts to heal from and prevent these wicked acts. Jesus' message is liberation, setting captives free (captive children, captive systems, captive minds). And Jesus' message is shown and witnessed when we do not turn away but rather turn towards these problems to seek better solutions, where we seek out how to do the work of restoration and seek wholeness.

It might seem like a no-brainer, but here's what I think Christians should be saying when it comes to the atrocities we are witnessing daily across our nation: Gun violence is horrific. Human beings slaughtering masses of other human beings is an abomination, a distortion of the image we all bear, a denial of all we share in common. And we need to work collectively to address this, for the life of the world.

Indeed, the solutions to such wicked problems are complex. Solving our mass shootings epidemic in America requires many layers of intervention, healing, and change. It is not quick work. But isn't it work that the people of the way of Jesus belong doing? Don't we value each other and the health of our communities that much? If we do, then we must speak up. Not just into the echo chamber that is our affinity groups. But boldly, publicly, and as Jesus would. There are money changers in the temple and we must overturn their tables.

Again, as I said above, even as a pastor with degrees and experience, I have never been formally trained or authorized to speak up about injustice. It's subtly implied to keep things neutral, palatable, and safe. And yet, if we look at the Scriptures and see how God's disciples and prophets spoke into the world, we do not see neutrality or palatability — we see witness! And that is what we, heirs to this tradition and the kingdom it proclaims, that is what we are to do as well.

Perhaps I have to give myself permission. Maybe we all have to do that, find our voices and then learn how to sing together to make the song of justice ring out. Or not. Or we could stay how we are. Or we can keep watching this wicked denial of humanity play out in silence and fear.

here and in all our places of brutality.


Move our Easter grief now...



## Highlights of the Session Meeting on May 8, 2022



- The Session and the Board of Deacons held their annual joint meeting before the Session meeting for the purpose of conferring on issues of joint concern.
- The deacons reported that coffee and fellowship time following worship has restarted.
- Interim Treasurer, Sharon King, is in the process of catching up on financial records. The process will take some time, but we are caught up on bill-paying and income records. Everything is looking good financially.
- The Clerk reported that Amy Morris was elected to the position of Deacon.
- The Session voted to allow our church school director, Tracy Caruso, to allocate funds from the budget to extend the hours of nursery staff to supervise children during coffee hour.


#### June 12th The Holy Trinity
