



PASTOR'S NOTE Submitted by the Rev. Seth J. Thomas

G

od promises never to leave us nor forsake us. In times of great joy, it is often relatively easy to see God's presence. Of course, we know God is present in favorable circumstances and blesses us in our work and lives. In the more trying times, however, we begin to wonder where God is—why do we face such struggle? Where is God when we are hurting or lonely?

Each year, as I try to summarize and frame all that I've seen God accomplish in our life together at St. James, I find myself attempting to paint a positive picture and hide from the messes we've found ourselves in and the struggles we've faced. There are yet again so many things we can be thankful for that God has done amidst us: We keep gathering, growing in faith and connecting our lives to the liberating story of God.

And yet, this year, it's harder to see the light. The weight of loss overshadows. And I've come to accept this is ok. It is ok for us not always to know what will come next. It's ok to step out in faith when we don't always have control over outcomes. And it is ok to look back to God and say, "Please, help. Be near."

As with each year, the passing of time and aging impacts our community. We celebrated the lives of Gale Pfueller, Irene Rome, Margaret de Maine and Milt Schayes, longtime St. James members who had a lasting impact on many of us. Each faced health difficulties in the last years of their vibrant lives, and we held space for them to live out their days with us gracefully. With the support of their families, we send them on into glory with Christ, entrusting them into God's kingdom community which we all await.

Sadly, this year was marked by a tragic death as well, for we were faced with supporting our church treasurer, Marina McLeod, as she battled a rare form of brain cancer that ultimately spread through her 34-year-old body. No family should have to say goodbye to their wife, daughter and friend at such a young age; no community should have to wrestle with a farewell to such a gracious friend this soon.

This year taught me how important it is to stay attentive to this present moment and all God has for us here and now. Life passes by. I recently talked with my son, Asher, about the meaning of the statement, "The days are long, and the years are short." Time passes, and our calling is to attend to the now, this moment, and what God is up to. We struggle with this because we want to be able to plan and control the outcomes down the road. tives to see things more favorably or find a silver lining. But what this year tells me is that all we have is now. Today, we abide in the presence of God's spirit and ask, "What shall we do today?" We do not hold any guarantee of a future, only a hope of the promise of our next breath. What will we do with the time we have?

As I look at the work we have before us at St. James, I am inspired to ask this question of us: "What shall we do today?" This congregation has persisted, grown and served our community for over 130 years by doing just this: listening for God's voice in this present hour and finding active ways to engage with its leading.

When I encountered St. James Presbyterian Church during the call process to become pastor, a mission statement on the website caught my attention. It said: "We are a welcoming Christian community, seeking God's purpose, listening for God's message and sharing God's love."

Each word is active—seeking, listening and sharing. They exist in the present as ways we engage in discerning the voice of God and going into the world to participate in God's direction.

It is ok for us not always to know what will come next. It's ok to step out in faith when we don't always have control over outcomes. And it is ok to look back to God and say, "Please, help. Be near." While our mission statement has adapted over the years to include additional pieces about loving welcome, joyful practice and compassionate service, this active sense still applies. Our work is to seek, listen and share the good news of God's love in the world around us, right here and now.

As you read this report, hear the stories of God's faithfulness as we've witnessed it all around St. James. From a new garden outside to expanding our Godly Play offerings, strengthening our financial structures and welcoming new tenants to share our beautiful space, we have seen God be faithful and sustain our call to ministry together. God is good.

In the coming year, I want to encourage you to take a more active stance on how you engage in the voice of God. This year is for us to keep listening, serving and loving one another. Now is the time we have; now is the moment for us to draw together and pursue that great purpose of God together. May we seek. May we listen. May we share.

And may we do this all in the name of Jesus Christ, who abides with us here and now, welcoming us into lives of meaning, purpose, grief and hope.

After two years of postponing due to pandemic concerns, St. James was finally able to have our long-awaited church retreat at Warm Beach in August. We also saw the return of Creation Camp in June! This was an incredible week in which we served nearly 40 kids (not including the middle and high schoolers who made up half our volunteers!). Campers raised over \$750 for World Relief and were given a \$500 match by an impressed grandmother. Campers learned new songs, heard Godly Play stories and participated in craft projects, science lessons and several new games.

Tracy is searching for additional youth service opportunities in the upcoming year. We have also resumed participation in Bellingham Community Partners and will again be partnering with Lowell Elementary School to provide students with snacks, mentors and help with ongoing needs.

Marina was an incredible gift to our community and we are saddened by her death. I personally had the pleasure of ringing the St. James bells with Marina, and her laughter was a welcome joy each week. She was deeply dedicated to all that she did, and during this year, we were held in large part by the foundation she laid for us. As a committee, our thoughts, prayers and love are with all of Marina's family and friends.

Highlights of 2022:

- Ray Dellecker and Pam Gibson have both been faithful committee members through thick and thin. I am grateful for their wisdom and for their presence.
- Sharon King has taken on a great deal of treasurer duties and is incredibly humble, willing to learn and an amazing problem-solver.
- Marina was an invaluable resource, both in the systems she created and in her willingness to consult as she was able.
- We have officially switched over to QuickBooks Pro with the help of a local business, Avlon Financial. This will make it easier for us to manage the day-in and day-out operating expenses and income of St. James.
- New tenants, including a local worshiping community, The Table, have helped to offset the loss from Hawthorne Learning Solutions and the Interfaith Coalition.
- We have been able to give toward all intended Mission & Social Action commitments, passing along 10% of pledged offerings in 2022.
- Overall, pledges and giving have outpaced expenses in 2022!

This has been a unique and "unprecedented" season in which to serve as your Finance elder, to say the least. I will continue serving on the committee but will be taking a break from Session while I support my teenagers into young adulthood. Thanks to the 2022 Finance & Stewardship committee (Pam Gibson and Ray Dellecker), along with Reverend Seth Thomas and Ministry Assistant Sharon King for their continued support. he Mission & Social Action (MSA) committee meets monthly to share news, discern where to best help our community and choose volunteer activities in the community. Our yearly budget, approximately \$17,000 in 2022, represents 10% of St. James' anticipated income. One of the committee's main functions is to select recipients of our mission funds. About two-thirds of our funds are given in support of local mission work, with the remaining third going to our Presbyterian Church (USA) denomination for national and international work.

A few of our local opportunities in 2022 included a booth at the Sacred Earth Fair, sponsored by the Multifaith Network for Climate Justice (MNCJ), and a volunteer workday at the Telegraph Road build-site for Habitat for Humanity. St. James also hosted several events, including a prayer vigil for peace in the Middle East, an evening prayer lamentation service to grieve continued gun violence and a movie, The Magnitude of All Things, which was sponsored by MNCJ and included a community discussion following the movie. MSA continued to support Family Promise by collecting and delivering meal kits. We also participated in the Interfaith Coat Drive as well as the Gardenview Christmas Stocking Project. MSA gave support to the Sanctuary Mental Health Ministries course this past fall and continued to explore ways to deepen our commitment as a Creation Care Congregation.

Our hope is to continue to propose actions for local and world organizations that further restoration of right relationships with each other, with our neighbors and with our Earth. We seek to continue work that impacts the wellbeing

Sabbatical Leave




